Leave for South

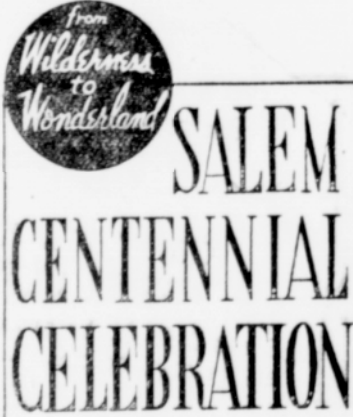

Frozen Foods New Home



Oregon, which is gaining vast new markets through the quick-freezing of its products, will profit still more by the introduction of frozen-food storage in American homes, predicted C. C. Cathey (right) of Associated Commercial company. Cathey is showing R. E. Staples and Larry Moore of Portland General Electric company how an Oregon duck—as well as fruits, vegetables and meat—can be kept "fresh" at zero temperatures in the home. Nutrition surveys indicate that Oregon's specialty produce—such as choice fruits and vegetables—will benefit from the growth of frozen-food consumption, replacing some of the heavy "staple" foods in the national diet.
