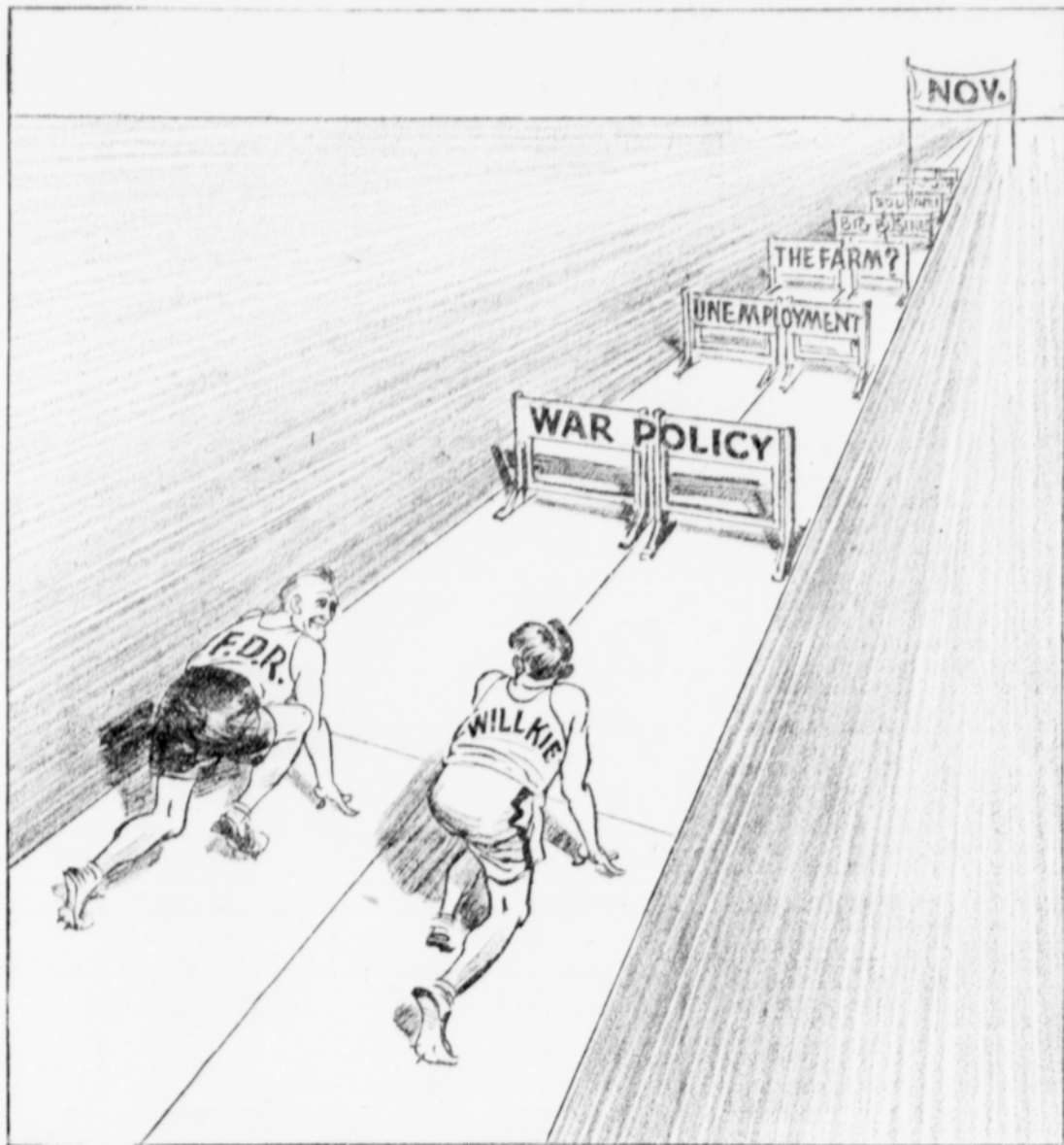

editorial of the class with a scholastic average of 98.25 per cent. She enrolled at the Iowa Agricultural college in 1887, but was forced by financial circumstances to stop.

She learned telegraphy, and took courses in electrical engineering and accounting which started her on a 43-year career with telephone companies. She was married in 1896 to Charles E. Wells, who was connected with this business, and continued to serve in various capacities through the years for six different companies.

Started in 1897 with the Boone County Telephone company as operator and bookkeeper, from 1899 to 1906 was cashier and auditor

of the Southwest Telephone company in Marion, Kans., from 1906 to 1912, was with the Gulf Coast Telephone company at Kingsville, Tex., and from 1912 to 1914 served the Falfurrias (Tex.) Telephone company.

In 1914, Charles Wells sold his Texas properties and the family moved to Hillsboro. In Oregon, Mrs. Wells continued her career as cashier, secretary and operator of the Hillsboro Telephone company, in which capacities she served until 1929, when the firm sold out to the Oregon Telephone company. She then became vice-president and auditor of the newly formed Northwest Telephone company with head offices in Hillsboro and exchanges in five Oregon cities.

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Hillsboro Teacher Attends State-Wide Agriculture School

John Durr, vocational agriculture teacher at the Hillsboro high school, is one of 37 such teachers now attending a three-week conference for the entire state staff being held at Oregon State college as part of the summer session.

The group is carrying out a definite daily program of seminars and reading and conference periods in which they are working out latest procedure in organization of advanced vocational classes. Such problems as the organization of agricultural teaching equipment, problems of administration, organization of farm mechanics work, as well as other items are on the list of conference topics. A total of 32 high schools now have vocational agriculture classes with a total enrollment of 2324. In this total registration, 2129 are members of the Future Farmers of America chapters. In the Hillsboro high school 41 are enrolled in the F. F. A. chapter.

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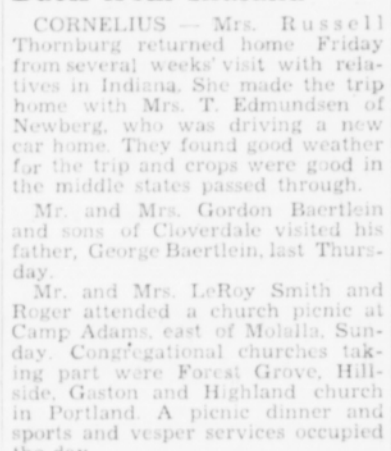
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
