Mid-week Mountain Top Bible study this week was held at the Glenn Meeker home.

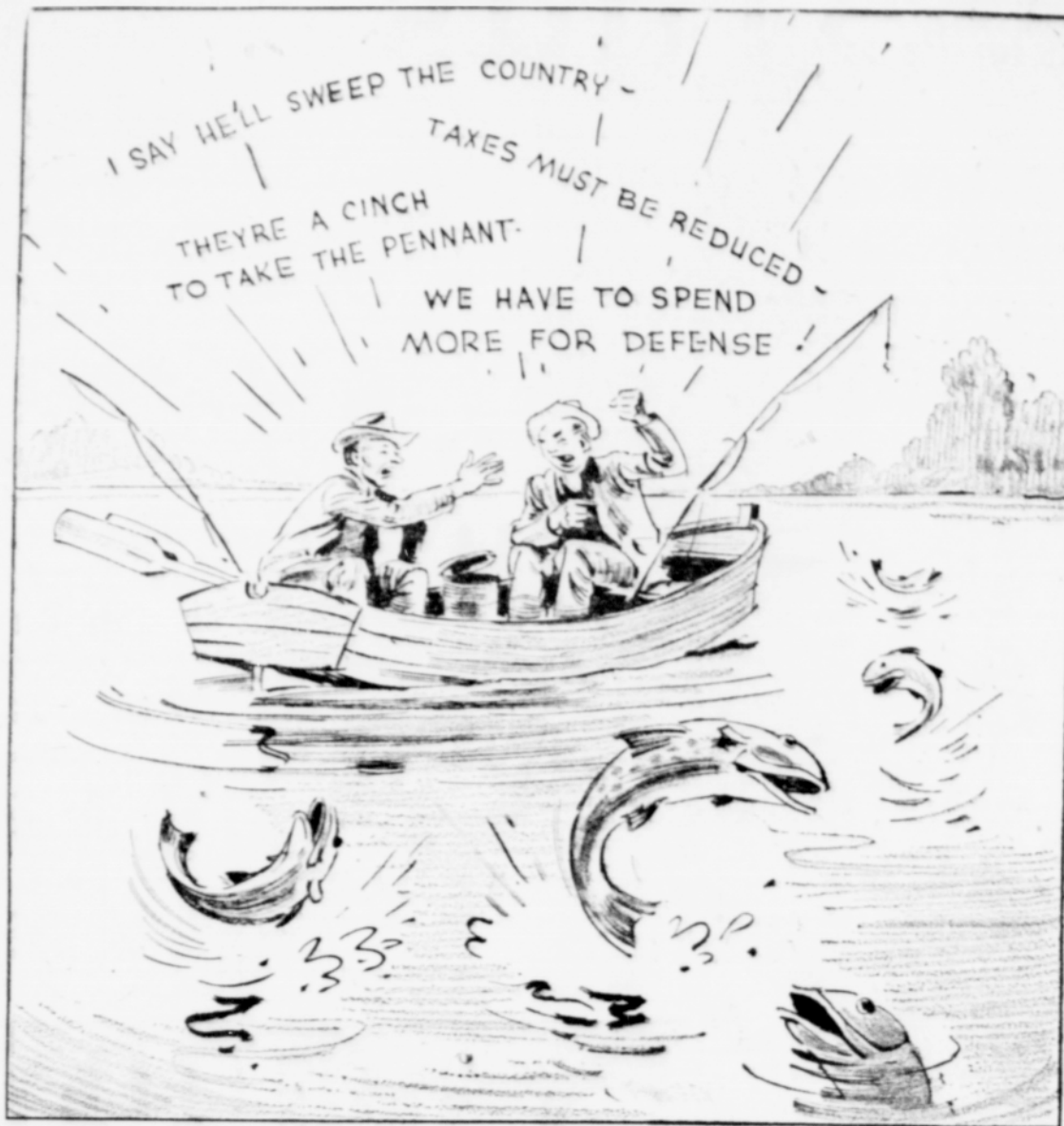

Rural Mail Box Improvement Set For This Week

To encourage patrons of the rural delivery service to provide suitable, easily accessible mail boxes, the federal post office department has designated the week starting today, August 1, as "Rural Mail Box Improvement Week." It was announced by Postmaster L. T. McPheters.

Unsuitable boxes detract from natural scenic beauty along the highway and are not a credit to their owners. He pointed out, and improperly constructed boxes retard delivery service and expose the mail to damage from the elements.

Boxes should be neat, able to protect the mail from damage, and have the name of the owner clearly visible to the carrier as he approaches. Patrons are not required to discard non-approved boxes of the top-opening revolving door, or other types if they have been in use and well-maintained for several years, but any receptacle not of standard type which cannot be served properly from the carrier's vehicle should be replaced with an approved box, the department said.

Particular care should be taken that the carrier cannot injure his hands while serving the boxes. Boxes and supports should be kept painted and in good repair at all times.

Patrons are urged to make use of this week to see that their boxes meet the requirements of a clean, neat and attractive. Rural carriers have been instructed to lend full cooperation in the campaign for improvement of equipment.

B. M. Bower, Famed Fiction Writer, Dies
Word came last week of the death in Los Angeles Thursday of B. M. Bower, colorful writer of western fiction. She was Bertha Muzzy Bower, 68, famed for the "Flying U" stories and many others.

While she was living at Depoe Bay in 1936, her son, Roy Bower, was drowned in a trolling boat while attempting to rescue a foundered excursion craft. A monument was erected at the site to commemorate the death of Bower and his companion, Jack Chambers, of Depoe Bay.
