Health Office Reports Almost Clean Slate In County Diseases

Only one contagious disease case was reported last week in Washington county, and that a case of measles in Forest Grove, the county health office announced Tuesday. No new cases of diphtheria, which had been quite widespread recently, have been reported for six weeks, Dr. Fred T. Burke, health officer, said.

He disclosed that the examination of pre-school age children is proceeding satisfactorily, with many more children being examined than last year. Six x-rays to determine possible presence of tuberculosis taken during the last week revealed that none of the patients had the disease, he said.

He also reported that ten Washington county children have been admitted to Doernbecher hospital for tonsilectomies during the week.
