

Mrs. R. Pribnow Succumbs to Long Illness Tuesday

Mrs. Rose Cox Pribnow, 66, resident of Hillsboro for many years, died Tuesday at her home after a six months' illness. Services will be held at 2 p. m. Saturday in the Donelson and Sewell chapel, with interment in the Fir Lawn Cemetery. Rev. A. J. Sullens will officiate.

Mrs. Pribnow was born in Eagletown, Indiana, May 28, 1874, and had made her home in Hillsboro for 27 years. She leaves many friends to mourn her death.

She is survived by her husband, W. P. Pribnow of Hillsboro; two daughters, Mrs. Lena Tows of Hillsboro and Mrs. Beulah Groves of Seaside; two sisters, Mrs. Ida Couch and Mrs. Eva Smith of Indiana; three grandchildren, Merle Harris, Portland, Mrs. Mildred Wilson, San Pedro, Cal., and Chester Morris of Seattle; and three great-grandchildren, Kenneth and Terry Morris, Seattle, and Dennis Wilson, San Pedro.

Mrs. Pribnow was a member of the Methodist church and the Hillsboro Grange. She had taken all degrees in the Grange and was a member of the National Grange.

Annual AAA Reports Shows Farms "Prepared"

The AAA farm program, with its encouragement of conservation and assistance in marketing, has helped materially in increasing Oregon's "agricultural preparedness," says the newly-released annual report for 1939 of the Oregon agricultural conservation committee.

Four leading farmers comprise the committee, William Steen of Milton, chairman, Will Enschede of Hillsboro, John Shepherd of Seio, and Robert Weir of Lakeview.

"At the time this report is being prepared," says the publication, "the word 'preparedness' is on the lips of everyone. No matter what America's future duties become, Oregon farmers will be well prepared to help with supplying food."

Farms Improved
"Since the beginning of the AAA (in 1933), Oregon's farm lands have been improved and farmers have gained in security and efficiency. The AAA organization, having 174 county committees and 1026 community committees in Oregon, would be ready at a moment's notice to operate effectively in meeting any demands upon the state's agriculture."

More than 36,000 Oregon farmers participated in the 1939 farm program, representing about 94 percent of the state's crop land. They received about six million dollars in federal payments.

Registration Age Cut in Proposed Conscription Bill

New developments in the Burke-Wadsworth compulsory military training bill came Wednesday when the senate military committee amended it to require registration only of men from 21 to 31 years old, instead of all between 18 and 64.

It was estimated that the alteration would reduce from 42,000,000 to about 12,000,000 the number of men to be registered. The vote on the amendment was unanimous, and final committee approval of the bill was expected today.

High Employment Of College Grads Found in Oregon

Oregon's institutions of higher learning averaged 92 per cent placement of 2900 graduates in the classes of 1938-39, according to a recent survey made at the direction of Chancellor F. M. Hunter. Actual reports on the present whereabouts and activities of each graduate were used in compiling the statistics. Those unaccounted for were put in the unemployed list, hence the figures obtained are considered conservative rather than otherwise, as doubtless many who were not located are placed in position.

"The commonwealth of Oregon is using the output of the institutions of higher education supported by the state almost to the full," Chancellor Hunter reported to the state board of higher education in releasing the figures obtained. "The record of absorption of graduates for the past two years is amazingly high, and indicates that Oregon is by no means assisting too many young people to obtain a college education."

"Today able economists advocate full use of scientific knowledge by a widespread education of consumers and producers alike. They hold that production and the increase of wealth in terms of goods and services would be enhanced as much as 75 per cent if complete education for our American population were to be achieved."

The survey of placement reveals that the six institutions ranged from 86 to 100 per cent employment of graduates, with the medical school leading, partly because of school-restricted enrollment. Southern Oregon College of Education and Oregon College of Education were close behind, with 93 and 95 per cent placement, respectively. Oregon State college showed 92 1/2 per cent total placement; the University of Oregon 83 1/2 per cent and Eastern Oregon College of Education reported 88 per cent.

Schools of engineering and pharmacy at Oregon State college showed 100 per cent placement for both years, and the school of science 100 per cent placement in 1939. At the university the schools of music and law showed 100 per cent placement in 1938.

Objection to the transfer of Oregon archives from Portland to Salem was voiced by Lewis A. McArthur, president, and Nellie B. Pipes, librarian of the Oregon Historical Society, before the state board of met. this week. These records, the Historical Society officials claim are now more readily accessible to a greater number of persons than they would be if returned to Salem. The archives, which consist of all state documents dealing with the provisional and territorial government were turned over to the Historical Society for safe keeping by the legislative session of 1931 until such time as adequate vaults could be provided for them in some building in the capitol group in Salem. Board of control members who feel that this requirement has now been met, both in the new capitol and the new library building, recently suggested the return of the records to the capitol city.
