Gershwin Music To Be Featured

The famous duo pianists of swing, Harry Fields and Marline Fingerle, whose brilliant swing version of the classics has set Hollywood agog, will be guest soloists for the Summer Symphony's fifth Open Air concert next Monday night in Multnomah Stadium. An All-American Gershwin program with plenty of swing will be given, the staid old Portland Symphony entering into the spirit of the occasion with gusto.

Radio fans will remember Harry Fields as Harry Fields Feldstein, who commenced his radio career in swing under KOIN auspices. More recently he has lived in Hollywood where with Miss Fingerle, he has become the sensation of the airways. He has made numerous selections by Benny Goodman and Bing Crosby on Kraft "Music Hall" shows, and is also a favorite in Hollywood Bowl concerts.

Among the numbers to be given by this brilliant piano duo will be a medley built around Gershwin's "Rhapsody in Blue" and Cole Porter's "Begin to Beguine," an American swing version of Rachmaninoff's "C Sharp Minor Prelude" and of Paderewski's "Minute in G," and the popular favorite "Tea for Two."

"Not to be outdone by the guest soloists, Conductor Jacques Gershwin has programmed for the orchestra, Gershwin's "American in Paris" adresections from his "Porgy and Bess" and in second part of the program which will be devoted to American composers other than Gershwin, will be selections by MacDowell, Paul White's amusing "Mosquito Dance" and Earl McDonald's rhythmic "Rumba."

The concert next Monday night will commence at 8:30 and as usual the stadium gates and box offices will be open at 7:30.
