Annual Farmington Reunion Held Sunday

FARMINGTON—The eleventh annual Farmington reunion was celebrated at the church here Sunday. Mrs. Lillian Jack favored the gathering with a recitation which she had given at school 71 years ago. Mrs. J. C. Hare of Portland presented the church with a plaque in memory of her grandparents, Philip and Sarah Harris, in whose home the first church services were held, and who were among the early pioneers to build the log church in 1852. The building was without any floor except the ground. This building was used until 1857 when a rough board building was erected. The present church was built in 1882, 38 years ago by George Patterson.

Mrs. Hare gave the history of her family dating back 100 years. Her grandparents came to Oregon, settling on the Harris donation land claim in 1845.

A picture of the Farmington school taken in 1887 was exhibited by Mrs. Fanny Robinson. There were 16 pupils in the picture and Mrs. Robinson's brother, the late E. L. McCormick, who taught the school. The building constructed of rough boards, was built in 1880 and was located not far from where the present school building now stands. Memorial mention was made of Mrs. Ella Thompson, Wilford Emmel, Margaret Emmel, Dr. N. H. Ben Jack, Peter Penn, H. E. Clippinger, and Dan Burkhalter.

Claud Johnson photographed the group past 80 years of age, including S. E. Olsen, the oldest member present, who is 87 years old.
