Retired Pastor Dies Cornelius; Rites Set Today

CORNELIUS—The Rev. William Adelbert Sprague, 66, retired Congregational minister, died at his home here Monday night after a year's illness. Funeral services will be held at the Forest Grove Undertaking company chapel today (Thursday) at 1 p. m. with Rev. Kellogg of Forest Grove officiating. Interment will be at Belcrest cemetery at Salem.

Rev. W. A. Sprague was born in Cowley county, Kansas, September 22, 1873, moved to Uniontown, Kan., with his parents, where he spent his childhood and early youth, and on September 9, 1896, he was married to Ida M. Winger in Crawford County, Kan., where he was then serving a country parsonage.

Rev. Sprague began his ministry at the age of 21 in the Methodist Protestant church in Kansas, serving several churches and becoming president of the conference from 1903 to 1906. In 1907 he transferred from the Methodist Protestant to the Congregational church. He held pastorates at Douglas and at Newton, Kan. In 1919 he moved to Washington, serving the Congregational churches in Tacoma, Astoria, and Pasco. While at Pasco he served as chairman of relief work and participated in many community projects.

In 1934 he resigned from his church at Pasco, and retired from the ministry. He and Mrs. Sprague came to the coast and located near Hillsboro in 1937. They moved to Cornelius where he resided until his death.

He is survived by his widow, Mrs. Ida M. Sprague of Cornelius; a son, Dr. Paul W. Sprague of Newton, Mass., and three sisters: Mrs. J. Brix of Portland, Mrs. A. L. Dark of Salem, and Mrs. William Moore of Washington, D. C.
