

Hillsboro Office, Gaston Grocery Are Burglarized

Burglarizing of the Pool-Gardner Lumber company office here with only small loss and of the J. D. Glover grocery at Gaston with about \$100 in cigarettes and merchandise stolen headed a long list of prowling theft cases reported to the sheriff's office this week.

Only 75 cents was found missing at the Pool-Gardner office here, according to police, but a large quantity of grocery stock was hauled away by the night marauder who broke a window to gain entrance to the Gaston store. The list of stolen articles included about 55 cartons of cigarettes, fresh and canned meats, eight dozen eggs, canned syrup, cigars, gum, candy and other items. Deputy Sheriff Dick Busch is investigating.

Cars Stolen

Three cars were reported stolen during the week. Kenneth B. Davison, Hillsboro, reported his auto taken on Monday night. John Timmerman, Hillsboro, found his car some time after he reported its theft but with two wheels removed. The machine was parked near the Carnation plant here. A third car theft was also being investigated by the sheriff's office.

J. J. Walsh, Buxton, reported his house was prowled sometime Monday and a small amount of cigarettes and tobacco found missing. Vern O. Bishop, Tigard route 1, complained to peace authorities that a prowler entered his bedroom, stole his trousers from where they were hanging on a closet door, took a bottle of milk from the refrigerator in the kitchen and a dollar bill from the trousers and later tossed the trousers back into the bedroom through an open window.

In view of the above facts the directors of our association are conducting tentative negotiations with the City Council of Cornelius regarding the formation of a Rural Fire Protection district in this territory. It has been found that there is enough property within the reach of modern equipment centered at Cornelius to make it possible to provide more adequate protection service to all of us within the contemplated territory at a really nominal cost.
