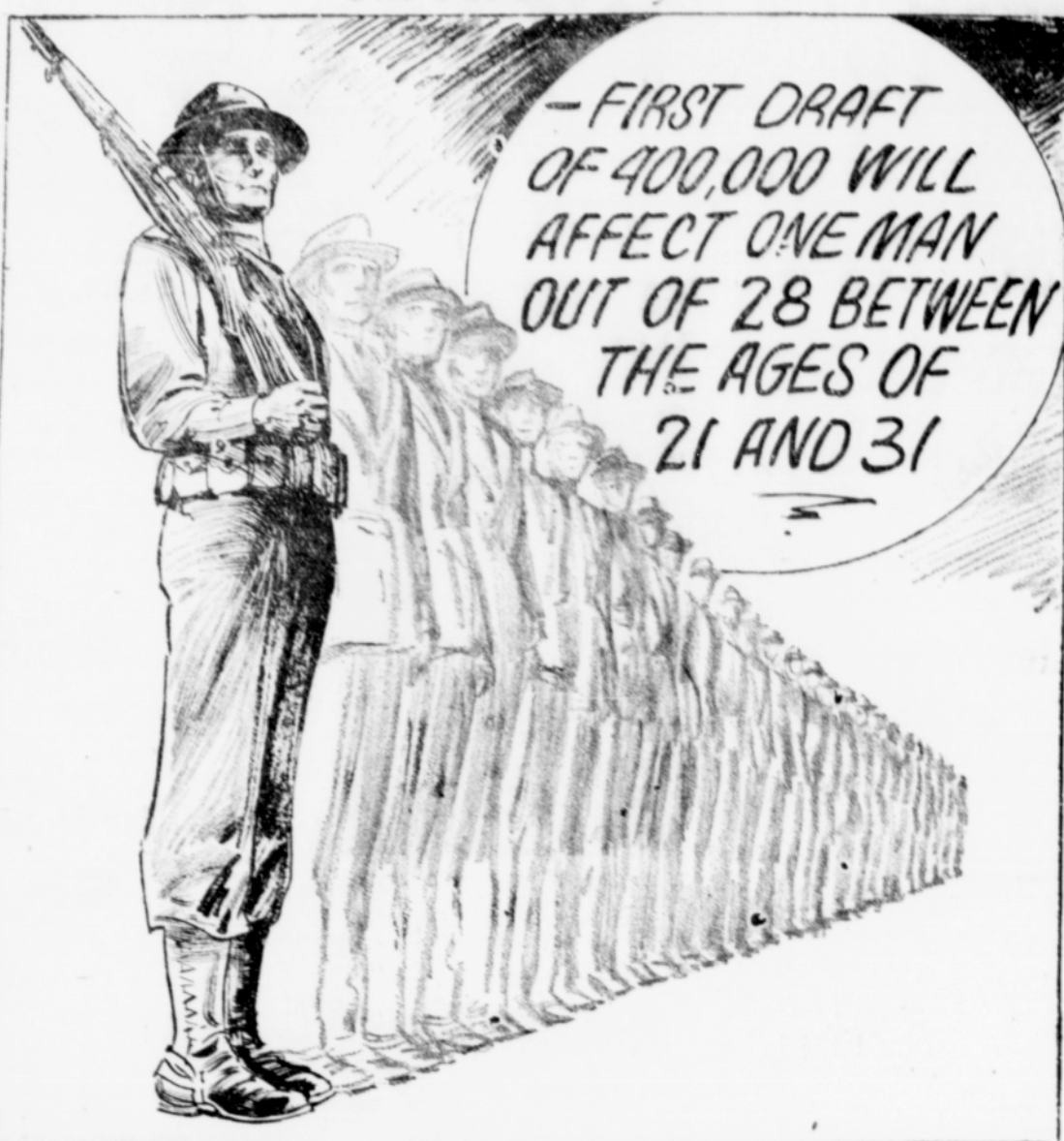
Rev. Aldrich Preaches
