

Women Leave Work For Camp Vacation

"Is that a toadstool or a mushroom? How can you tell the difference between a fir and a hemlock? These and many other questions pertaining to nature study were asked by fifty-two homemakers of Washington and Clackamas counties who attended a four-day camp at Silver Creek recreational area under direction of the home economics extension service of Oregon State College. Cecil Buckley, supervisor of the park area, guided the study of leaves, trees, flowers, birds, and animals found in the park.

Outstanding events of the camp were the four mile hike on the Silver Creek Falls state park trail, made by 38 of the 52 women on Wednesday morning; a brief sketch of new biography, travel, humor, fiction, and drama books by Miss Harriet Long of the state library; a vesper service each evening in a sheltered outdoor nook with the aid of a portable organ; travel talks and singing around the campfire; a picnic lunch in the state park; a planked salmon dinner served around the campfire; construction of articles of basketry, needle-point and textile pictures.

Camp Last of Four

This camp, the last in a series of four homemakers' camps at the same site, was directed by Miss Hazel Packer, Multnomah county home demonstration agent. Kathleen McCrae, Washington county home demonstration agent, assisted the director. Mildred Johnson of Boring directed group activities. Miss Olive Banks of Silverton was swimming instructor. Mrs. Nana Andersen of Troutdale was basketry instructor and Helen Morgan of Gaston was camp "sheriff."

The oldest camper in the group was 73 years old; the youngest, 23 years old.

This is the sixth annual camp for Clackamas county women and the first since 1936 for Washington county women, according to Miss McCrae.

McNeals Report Life in Tahiti Still Enjoyable

Mr. and Mrs. Robert E. McNeal, former Hillsboro residents who have been living a life of ease in Tahiti since June, 1939, are enjoying themselves to such a degree, in fact, that they have "made no arrangements for returning home," according to a letter received from them recently by J. L. Anderson of this city.

The McNeals, dealing at some length with living conditions and customs on the mid-Pacific island, is quoted in excerpts: "The weather is an even temperature all the time, slightly cooler at night. The lagoon water is just a little warm for longtime swimming. Fishing is not so good with hook and line as it commonly used to be. Traps and spears, electricity within radius of about 3 miles of Papeete although few if any electric ranges here. . . . mostly kerosene stoves, a few ice boxes. . . . vegetables here, grown by Chinese. Very tasteless but plentiful and cheap."

"French is the prevailing language. Tahitians are compelled to learn French but do not talk it among their kind. Few Tahitians have much education and education is not encouraged. . . . few Americans here. . . . some come here because their past actions will not permit them to live elsewhere. Some very disgraceful characters reside in the islands. Few people marry—they grab a woman and start a family—no disgrace about that, apparently."

"One dollar is worth 43.59 francs now. Although it is really worth 32 francs, the government bank will not pay it. War regulations make all transactions difficult. The French government has taken charge of all business."

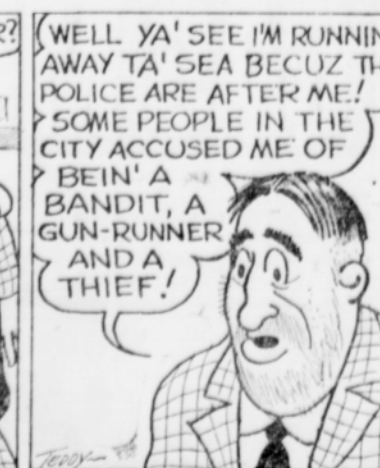
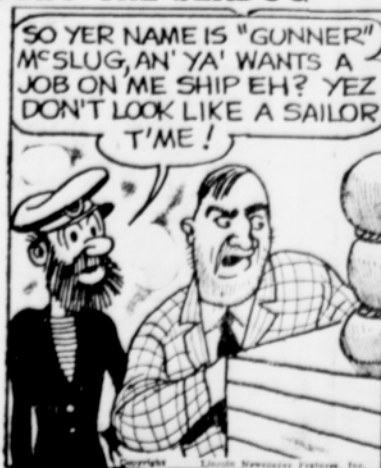
