Afloat on the broad Columbia river will be outboard racing boats, inboard racing boats, purse sailing boats, gullnet and trolling fishing boats, sailboats of all classes, private cabin cruisers and the admiral's flagship, "S. S. Rube Adams." Coronation Wednesday evening, August 28, will be a colorful pageant staged on a floating pavilion before the marine stadium.

some solid food such as vegetable hash or stew or beans.

"For the rest of the time, however, the food come from established field kitchens and could not be complained about except for the lack of time necessary to consume it. This was caused by the advance of the enemy, which caused us to be routed out of our bedrolls or away from mess on several occasions.

"On this four-day maneuver, all routine such as falling in for various formations and saluting of officers is put aside. All that each man was required to do was that which his post called for when firing or on the move.

**Unot Commended**  
"Battery E was highly commended by the third battalion staff officers for their expediency in pulling out of one position and moving in and laying their howitzers for new fire commands. For example, we loaded all equipment and coupled the guns to the trucks and were out of one position in less than 15 minutes.

"The maneuver proved one thing, according to Lt.-Col. Cochran. This was that the 15 mm howitzer has no place in a mechanized division. He said they should be placed in the army reserve corps artillery and that when we come back from our year's training, we will be completely outfitted with 24 new trucks and the newest type 105 mm. guns.

"General White also gave us a short talk the day before the maneuver and stated that we would be housed in barracks before winter. As to the exact date for our return, we are as yet completely in the dark, but General White said we could look for it within a month of our arrival home.

"We'll be coming home Saturday morning."

### Navy Recruiting To Retain Policy Of High Standards

As a result of numerous inquiries received by various naval activities in regard to the enlistment in the navy of men with prison or juvenile police records, Lieutenant Commander L. B. Stuart, navy recruiting officer for the Portland recruiting district, made public today a recent statement of secretary of the navy, Honorable Frank Knox, concerning the navy department's policy in connection with recruiting.

"In order that the efficiency of the navy may be unimpaired, it is vital that only young men of the highest type physically, mentally and morally, be accepted for service. The very close associations and contacts necessitated by the service of young men in vessels of the navy require that all men be of unquestionable character. The navy is having no difficulty obtaining men of this high type. In fact, there is a waiting list of slightly over three thousand men at present.

**Requirements Stressed**  
"Thousands of young men are enlisted in the navy each year and the very high requirements are being stressed constantly. Parents, school officials, ministers, and the public in general are informed that the associations met in the service will be clean and honorable, and this assurance, I believe, is directly responsible for many parents consenting to the enlistment of their sons.

"Out of consideration for the parents of these fine young men, many of whom are at their most impressionable age, there can be no lowering of our high standards in the interest of any group or individual. Further, in view of the fact that many excellent boys who have established their complete fitness for enlistment have been turned away each year because there are no vacancies, I do not believe that it would be sound policy to lower our standards in any respect, no matter how laudable our motives.

"In view of the above reasons I feel that our policy, as outlined in the instructions to recruiting officers, is a sound one. Past experiences have made it necessary for us to issue the instructions referred to. However, the case of each applicant is carefully studied, and determination is made upon individual merits."

### City Sees Work on Streets, Parking Lot

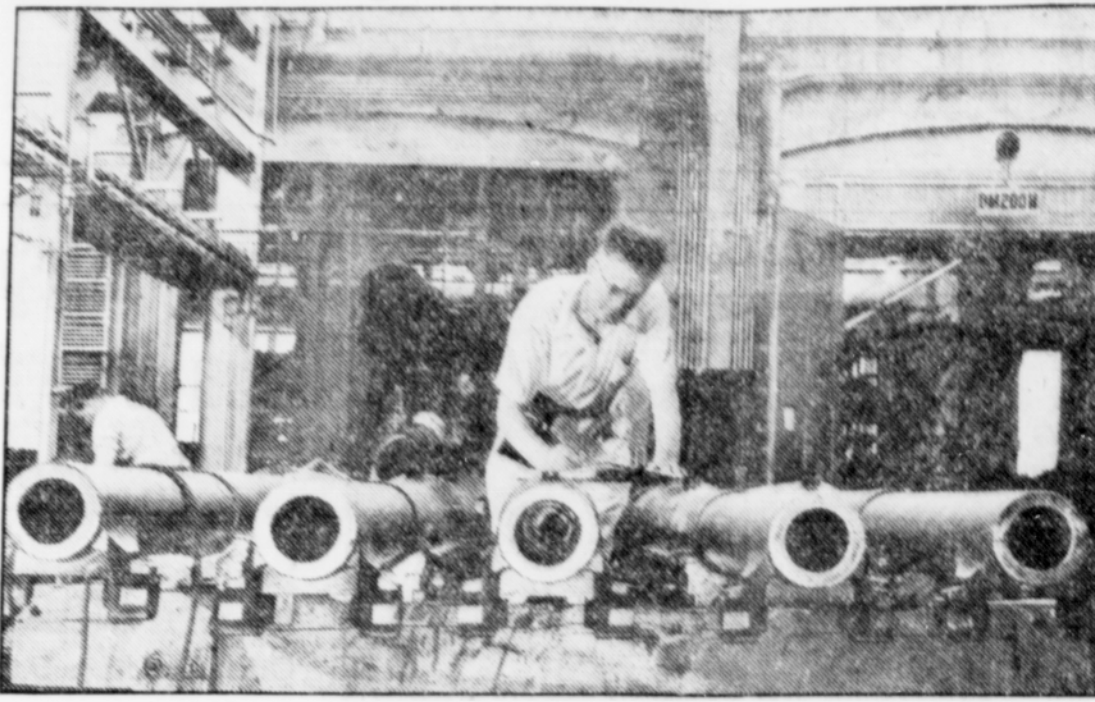
Paving of the Fifth and Lincoln intersection and of widened portions of First avenue between Main and Jackson streets was under way Tuesday, D. F. McKenzie of Oregon City is the contractor.

Work on the city's new free parking lot on the corner of First avenue and Washington street has been completed through the leveling process, meanwhile, and laying of rock as a hard surface is due to get under way immediately.

The parking lot will be ready for use before or on September 6, date on which the city's recently enacted parking law will go into effect. Hillsboro's restricted parking zone is extended over a wide area surrounding the main business section by the new ordinance. Signs have been ordered and are to be in place by the enforcement date, according to City Manager J. W. Barney.
