

Prowl, Theft Reports Filed With Sheriff

Washington county's "crime and punishment" history was enlarged by an entire chapter this week as reports of various and sundry unlawful behavior flooded into the sheriff's office.

Numerous thefts and house prowls are on the books. Carl Weideman, who lives south of the Standard Oil plant at Beaverton, reported his house ransacked with loss of the following: two penny banks, a nickel with a hole in the center, a bottle of milk and three packages of cigarettes.

Andrew Huff, Hillsboro, reported to city police that his bicycle, a bathing suit and a flashlight are missing and believed stolen. Two children's banks containing about \$3 in coins were robbed of contents by a prowler who broke into the home of Freeman Dull, Beaverton, sometime between August 4 and 13.

Barley Stolen
Charles Buchanan, who operates a Witch Hazel farm, reported that on the night of August 18, five sacks of barley were stolen from a field on his place.

Maye Ashford of Aloha will go to trial in justice court here Tuesday August 27, on a charge of unlicensed sale of liquor.

Frank Gravelle, 42, Beaverton pleaded guilty to a charge of drunken driving in A. W. Havens justice court Wednesday and was sentenced to 30 days in the county jail and fined \$150 and costs, the jail term to be suspended on payment of fine and costs. According to Justice Havens, it was Gravelle's second offense.

Pays \$25 Fine
John P. Forsman, 44, Willamina, pleaded guilty before Justice Havens to a charge of reckless driving and was assessed \$25 and costs. Edward G. Kindel, Forest Grove, was fined \$10 and costs for violation of the basic rule.

Carmen Johnson, 23, Portland, was booked at the county jail on a charge of larceny of clothes from a Forest Grove residence.

Nazis Attempt Smaller Raids

Germans reported Wednesday to have changed their tactics from mass air raids to "sneak-in" attacks by individual bombers and almost constant patrols of British planes.

War took on a new intensity in the Mediterranean Wednesday as Italy launches a "total blockade" of British territories in that region. The Italian news agency reports a furious air-sea battle in which it said seven British planes were shot down. Raiding warplanes drop bombs on Gibraltar. The British earlier in the week retired from British Somaliland.

Meanwhile in this country Attorney General Robert Jackson announces that he and the heads of the war, navy and state departments had discussed legal questions involving American acquisition of naval and air bases in the Atlantic from Great Britain. It also included discussions on the legality of the transfer to Britain of over-age U. S. destroyers.

Former Resident Here Dies After Airplane Crash

Raymond Turner Bennett Jr., 21, son of Mr. and Mrs. Raymond T. Bennett of Portland and native of Hillsboro, was fatally injured Sunday afternoon when he crashed a home-made one-seater airplane about a mile north of the Salem Municipal airport.

Eye witnesses to the fatal crash said Bennett was coming down for a landing when he was forced to soar upward to avoid another plane. The plane then flew about a mile north and suddenly plummeted to earth from an altitude of about 200 feet, it was reported.

Bennett was still alive when rescuers found him pinned in the plane wreckage but he died about 15 minutes after being taken to the Salem general hospital. The plane was owned by an Albany man, who reportedly had given Bennett permission to fly it on a test flight from Portland to Salem.

Funeral services for the former Hillsboro youth were held Wednesday in Young's funeral home with interment in the Fir Lawn cemetery.

Surviving are both parents, two brothers, Lee and Calvin, and a sister, Marjorie Lou, all of Portland. Mrs. Martha Bennett of Hillsboro, the youth's grandmother, also survives.

Raymond Bennett Jr. was born in Hillsboro on June 16, 1919. The entire family are former residents of this city.

Large Funeral Held
The funeral here was one of the largest ever held in this city. As final ceremonies were in progress at the cemetery, four planes circled over the burial ground and executed air maneuvers traditionally known to fliers as a tribute to the memory of a buddy who died in aviation.

The fliers, all personal friends of the mishap victim, were Ed Ball and Les Lackey of the Ed Ball air service, Bud Halston of the Ralston air service and Jack Thorley of Swen Island airport, Portland.

Pallbearers, also aviation colleagues of the deceased youth, were Ervin McBride, M. Busswell, J. Matson, Clyde Saltee, Leonard Pohl and Jack Higgins. Rev. Schmidt, an evangelist from Portland, conducted the services.
