that drove in a side road directly into the heart of the flaming inferno to save the homes of R. W. Hanson and V. L. Heinkle. Young Robert McLaughlin said that one member of the truck tank crew came back with his socks practically burned away.

A Red Cross truck with a doctor and nurse started to set up a station at the store but when they saw how efficiently the fire victims were being cared for out of the store's supply of medical goods, they went on to another part of the burning area. Twelve fire trucks, manned by all the "off duty men" from the Portland fire department, along with approximately 20 tank trucks, aided by 60 CCC recruits from Camp Reicher and other fire-fighters from both Washington and Multnomah counties fought the stubborn blaze.

The Bonny Slope store sold \$300 worth of supplies during the duration of the blaze Saturday night and Sunday. Such items as milk, fruit juices, soft drinks, ice cream, candy bars, lunch meats and coffee were much in demand. Clifford McLaughlin, owner of the Bonny Slope store, stated Cliff also sold 300 fire-fighters with sandwiches and coffee "on the cuff."

A checkup Monday afternoon listed the homes of Gene Alexander, Fred Keller, H. Baldwin, Ward Wells, the old Mead place, and the former home of E. H. Bauman, as burned. Ernest Emmerson's garage and barn with 100 bales of hay burned to the ground. It was a tragic but colorful sight. Charles Kellogg's barn and woodshed along with Andy Smith's pump house went up in flames.
