

Reorganization Set By Methodist Women

Women associated with the Methodist church and its work will reorganize Sunday night, September 1, in conformity with the plans of the new united church. A charter night program and ceremony have been arranged, application cards for members have been secured and certificates of charter membership, Rev. Aldrich says, will be issued to all who join on that night.

This movement marks a new epoch in women's work of the church as all women's organizations formerly existing, such as Ladies Aid societies, Wesley guilds, missionary societies, organized bible classes and the like are to be amalgamated under the one banner, and will simply become departments of the "Women's Society of Christian Service," the name by which this branch of the work of the church will now be known. The parent bodies have been re-incorporated under the new name, the General conference, the Jurisdictional conference and the Oregon Annual conference organizations have been formed and this program sets up the local organization which completes the task.

Requirements of membership are "An offering, and a pledge of prayer and service." Size of the offering is not stipulated, and membership in the church, while strongly urged, is not required. Officers are chosen from among the members, and the general president is the only officer of whom it is stipulated that she must be a member of the church.

The program, says Mrs. Thomas Connell, chairman of the committee, will be of interest to the general public. There will be special music and decoration, and the officers of the new body will be elected. A nomination committee will report and other nominations may be made from the floor. It is expected that approximately 200 women will be present.
