Mrs. M. Donald Spencer advised at the Washington County League of Women Voters meeting for prospective voters at a luncheon at Forest Hills Golf club that only verified information of candidates should be repeated. Rumors, surmises and gossip retailed as statements she characterized as one of the obnoxious practices in political campaigns.

Presenting her topic, "An Informed Electorate," Mrs. Spencer introduced the more serious aspects of her subjects, with amusing anecdotes of the horror created in early Portland by interest in the "votes for women" movement by the first appearance of women on election boards, by a visit of Carrie Chapman Catt and the meetings of women interested seriously in government. Know your government, prospective voters were advised. Be a participating citizen, rather than an accepting citizen, she said.
