County Makes Use Of State Library

Washington county residents made good use of the state library, according to figures released in the biennial report of Harriet C. Long, state librarian. During the two-year period ending on June 30, 1940, the mail order service was used by 1987 rural residents, who were reached through Washington county's 27 postoffices.

Traveling libraries were found in 78 communities, in each of which some one person gave his or her services to act as volunteer librarian in order that others in the neighborhood might enjoy the state's book service. Public libraries in Washington county borrowed 2608 volumes during this time.

Classrooms Call County's Youth

September 3 Opening Day for Many Schools;
Others to Start 1940-41 Year on 9th, 16th

Vacations will be over for a large portion of Washington county's elementary and high school youths on Tuesday, when the time-worn three r's—"reading, riting and 'rithmetic"—will take their place in week-day routine for another year.

Grade and high schools in Hillsboro will open their doors on the traditional date—the day after Labor Day—as will

33 other grade schools and three other union high schools in the county, but the greater proportion of schools will launch 1940-41 classroom work on Monday, September 9, and a few will extend vacations until the following Monday, September 16.

Open Labor Day

Out in front and one day ahead of the field are Gales Creek and Hillside schools, where first day registration is set for Monday, Labor Day. Although out of the ordinary, this day-early start is not in violation of any school regulations, according to County Superintendent O. B. Kraus.

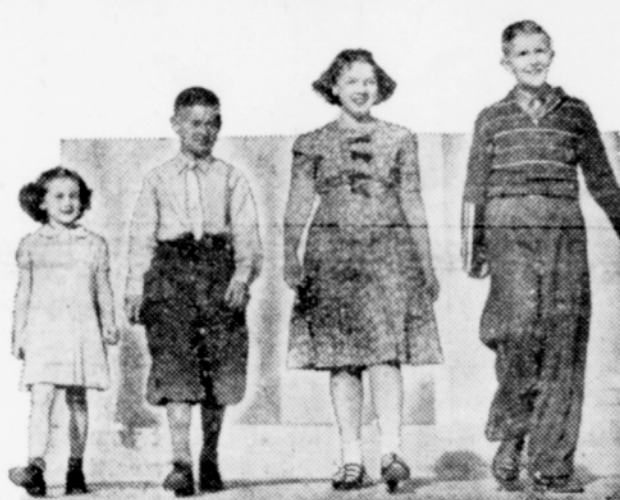

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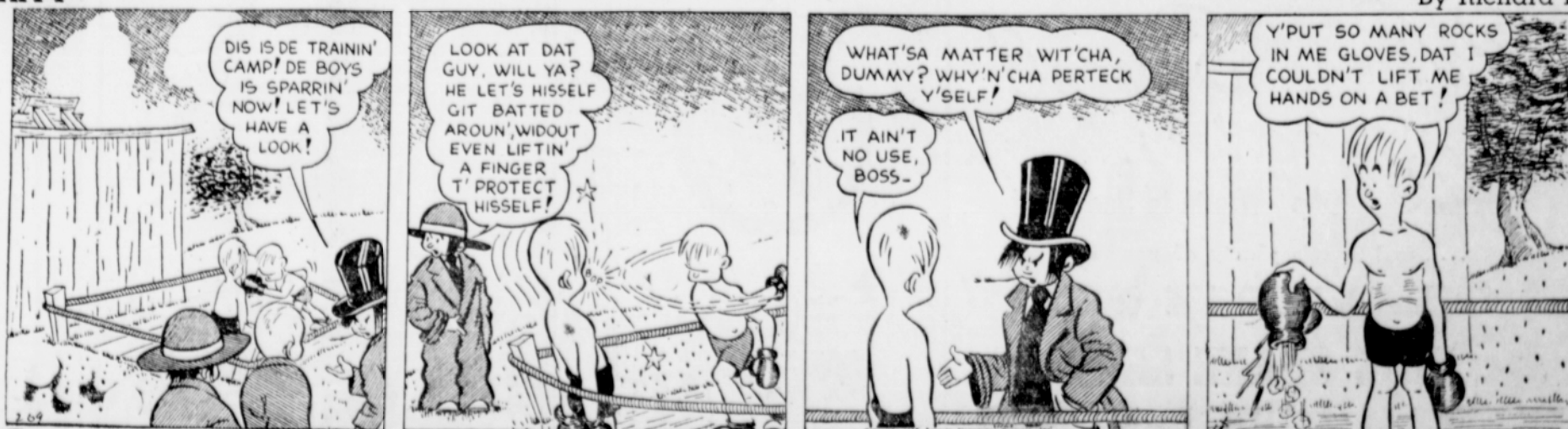

Classes First Day

Opening day of school will be a full day for union high school students, who are to get their books in the morning and report to classes in the afternoon. The union high school district bus schedule will be unchanged and is to be maintained on the first day of school.

Grade school pupils will come in the morning for registration and assignment of books but will be dismissed for the day at noon. Buses will bring the pupils home. Kindergarten children will also come for only a half-day. Parents are requested to arrange with Miss Gray, the kindergarten teacher, about which of two sessions they wish their children to attend.

Check-ups Later

Health check-ups for Hillsboro grade pupils will be made in September under direction of Miss Pennington. Superintendent Poynter emphasized that this check-up is a health inspection and not a health examination.

Cafeterias in the local elementary buildings will open on Wednesday but no hot dishes will be served until cooler weather comes. Items that will be served include milk, orangeade, fruits, sandwiches, salads, desserts and ice cream.

Entrance age for beginners as set by the state legislature last year is six years on or before November

15th for the first grade. The Kindergarten will accept children who are five on or before November 13.

Issues Statement

Other items of instruction for parents of grade school children are contained in a signed statement received by the Argus this week from Superintendent Poynter.

"If at all possible, see that your child starts the new year by entering on the first day of school. His attendance after that should be as regular as is possible. At no time, however, do we want children at school whose physical condition is not up to par. They do not profit and often create handicaps for others. Especially do we ask parents to avoid sending children who have common colds. Teachers are asked to watch for colds and are advised to send home children who are so afflicted. Teachers are expected to

observe the same rule themselves.

"Dress your children as comfortably as you can. Teachers are not concerned about children wearing fine clothes but we do insist upon them wearing clean clothes.

"Let's close this article by saying that it is extremely important for parents to inform the teachers for any physical or mental handicaps that a child may have. Such children will be administered to accordingly and we will go as far as is practical in trying to take care of any such handicaps."—J. W. Poynter.
