

City Building Totals \$12,975 In September

Eleven building and remodeling permits representing \$12,975 in Hillsboro construction were issued at the city recorder's office here during the month of September. Four of the permits were for new residences.

H. E. Thompson took out a permit for a \$4000 home which he is putting up on Sixth avenue between Main and Washington for Mr. and Mrs. John Lantz. Other residence permits were issued to Victor VanMeltebeke, 247 South 10th, \$200; J. W. Dixon, corner of First avenue and Jackson street \$3,700, and T. W. McDonald, on Jackson School road, \$2000.

Almost in the "new" classification are extensive remodeling operations on the Minnie Coy residence at 348 South Seventh avenue, which was gutted by flames recently. The remodeling cost is set at \$2000.

Other permits were issued to W. W. Thomas for a \$35 woodshed at 373 North Connell avenue; B. F. Pile for \$200 remodeling and alteration job on his store at 150 E. Main; Mrs. E. E. Uller for \$140 woodshed and utility room which she is having built on her property at 258 South Third avenue; F. W. McLain for a \$300 chicken house at 1061 East Jackson; the Pentecostal church for \$200 in new shingling, and Ed Soule for \$150 alteration of buildings at his service station on Third avenue and Washington street.

Grauer, Beaverton, suffered cuts from flying glass. The latter pair were starting out on a deer-hunting trip.

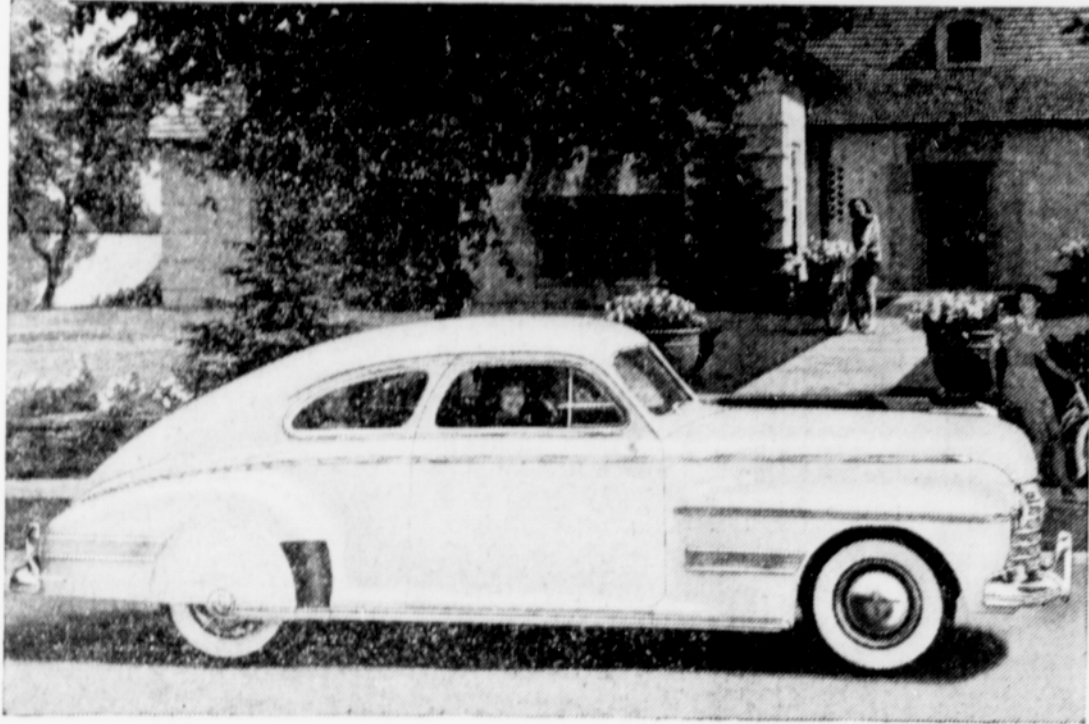

British Claim Their Planes Scoring Hits

British Royal Air Force bombers claim vital points in Berlin including machinery, munitions factories and power plants blasted Tuesday night. The RAF attack extended from the French channel ports to Belgium and Holland and many points in Germany as a sweeping offensive was carried out against German war centers.

London military circles express belief German high command has taken over direction of Italian operations in North Africa. Report circulated that Lloyd George may succeed Neville Chamberlain in cabinet.

Japan, Germany and Italy announce mutual assistance pact, which is plainly intended as a threat to the United States not to intervene in either the European or the war in Asia.

William Verboort was born in the town of Verboort on April 2, 1876, the son of Mr. and Mrs. Albert Verboort, who settled in that vicinity when much of Washington county was yet wilderness. A retired farmer, William Verboort lived in the community his entire life.
