

Walter VanDyke, County Resident 60 Years, Dies

Walter VanDyke, 64, resident of Washington county virtually all his life, died Tuesday at his home on Forest Grove route 2, after an illness of over two years. Funeral services will be held at 9:30 a. m. Friday in the Visitation church at Verboort. Father Jonas officiating, with interment in the Visitation church cemetery. Forest Grove Undertaking company is in charge of arrangements.

Surviving are the widow, Margaret, Forest Grove route 2, and four children: George, Theodore and Clarence, all at Forest Grove; Howard and Ralph, Forest Grove route 2; Joseph, Gaston, Bert, Hillsboro, and Raymond, Dallas; Mrs. Henry Holmeyer, Forest Grove; Mrs. George Dwyer, Roy; Mrs. Ed Sahfeld, Hillsboro; and Loretta, Florence and Leona, all of Forest Grove route 2; three brothers, John, Henry, and William, and three sisters, Mrs. William Verboort, Mrs. William Vanderveiden and Mrs. Albert Jensen, all of Forest Grove.

Walter VanDyke was born on September 27, 1876, in Wisconsin. He came to this county with his parents at the age of four years and had been a resident continuously since that time. He was married at Verboort in 1901 and at that time started farming. He had been retired for the past few years.

Georgians Hail Oregon Pea Seed

How Oregon's big pea and vetch seed industry looks from "the other end" is partially revealed in a recent news release issued by the Georgia Extension service which reads in part as follows:

"Georgia's farmers, now in the swing of fall's biggest planting, have ordered approximately 9,000,000 pounds of Austrian winter peas through the AAA grant-of-aid plan, in addition to sizeable amounts of cover crop seed purchased outright on the open market for local sale and home use, according to E. D. Alexander, agronomist for the Georgia Extension service.

"Mr. Alexander predicted that more winter legumes would be planted in Georgia this season than ever in the state's history, provided present interest continued. County agents, AAA committeemen, vocational teachers, soil conservation technicians, Farm Security supervisors and other agencies working with farmers are manifesting great enthusiasm in the soil building campaign, he asserts."

"All of the Austrian winter pea seed supplied through the AAA came from Oregon.
