

New Safeway Store to Herald Opening with Preview Tonight

A gala preview, including entertainment, free samples galore and other "open house" attractions, will be held in Hillsboro's new Safeway store tonight (Thursday) between 7 and 9 o'clock, to herald opening of the new \$160,000 store on the following morning (Friday).

A loud-speaker system will be installed for the evening entertainment and a master-of-ceremonies will inform the visitors of open-house highlights. Roses will be distributed to the ladies and novelty souvenirs will be handed out to the men.

Coffee will be served and hostesses representing several well-known foods will be presented in demonstrations featuring distribution of samples. Ample parking space for visitors' cars will be found in the 65x125-foot paved area adjoining the drive-in market.

Ray Miller, Safeway manager in the old location, will continue in that capacity at the new market.
