

Mrs. Arnest, D.A.R. State Regent, Visits

Objects of the National Society of Daughters of American Revolution are historical, educational and patriotic, according to Mrs. Howard P. Arnest, state regent of the D. A. R., who was the guest speaker Monday afternoon at David Hill chapter meeting, held at the home of Mrs. Fred Beach near North Plains.

Mrs. Arnest, who returned last week from the Golden Jubilee celebration of the organization of the D. A. R. in Washington, D. C., gave a graphic description of that memorable meeting. Mrs. Harrison, wife of the late President Benjamin Harrison, was the first regent of the organization, and it is quite remarkable that 45 charter members are still living, 18 of whom attended the celebration. She told about the Jubilee banquet which was attended by a large number of dignitaries. The speakers' table was spread with a lovely gold-colored cloth, and all tables were decorated with vases of golden chrysanthemums and the gold table service of the White House, which had been offered for the occasion.

Speaking of the work of the D. A. R., Mrs. Arnest said:

"Believing that the one achievement above all others which America must preserve is that of Good Citizenship, the Daughters are making special effort to help the new citizens of our land become the best citizens that they possibly can—to give them Manual for Citizenship, Flag Codes, Flags and any literature which may help them. They are also assisting with night schools, and have not shut their eyes to the necessity for education for citizenship to perpetuate the Republic whose very name has become synonymous with freedom. We believe that to the schools and churches belongs the responsibility for developing citizens worthy of inheriting the blessings of a free land."

"Special projects for the State society this year are placing a historic marker at the Vista House on the Columbia River highway in memory of Madam Dorian, the first white woman settler in Oregon, and contributing to the purchase of the Oregon bell in the national capitol at Valley Forge."

State chairman accompanying Mrs. Arnest from Portland were Mrs. F. L. Stockle, Americanism chairman; Mrs. Roy D. Armstrong, press relations chairman; and Mrs. E. K. Scott, chairman on patriotic education. All made short talks on their work.
