Kelleys Back from Trip to Canada; Give Observations

Mr. and Mrs. J. W. Kelley returned Thursday from an eight-day trip into British Columbia, where they visited relatives.

They made the following observations: They did not learn whether or not President Roosevelt set aside any particular day for their national day of thanks, but they did miss out on the turkey dinner there, as they had theirs on October 13. The new highway, and a dandy too, has just been completed between the border and New Westminster, called the King George Road and said by Vancouver papers to be the finest road in British Columbia.

Crossing the border line at Blaine and returning the same route was made easy by procuring from the county clerk's office here before they left, a certification of citizenship.

War is very much in the air in Canada, and nearly all are working at it. The Boeing company is building a large factory on Sea Island, just across the road from the city airport there. There seems to be a large amount of activity at the airport, a very well equipped field, and many young men in training. To assist the Canadian and English fliers now training in Canada, the huge Royal Mail steamer "Aurora," direct from Australia, docked there and several hundred highly trained airmen unloaded and within a half hour were loaded on two special trains en route to Eastern Canada.

A great many refugee English children are now being cared for in all the Canadian provinces and cities, and the Canadians esteem it a privilege to have them, and also to be working for the mother country.

Taxes there are very high, that being especially true on luxuries and tobacco. In order to get with that situation the Canadian ten-cent package of cigarettes contains now only eight fags.

The housing situation for the Canadian conscription army is similar to that of our own. They are temporarily short of barracks and for that reason 1000 of their recruits are being housed in this time in one of the leading Vancouver hotels, where they have rooms with bath and rooming suite, but without bell hop or maid service. Anyway it is a swell dish for the ones quartered there. There is a lot of war activity also. At Seattle the Boeing plant is being expanded to more than double its present size. It is a unique sight to see the expansion there. At Fort Lewis, Washington, they are as busy as bees. Acres and more acres of tents are to be seen as far as the eye reaches on either side of the highway and new barracks are going up in many places. Camp Murray is also getting several new buildings.

Much new highway and bridge construction is in progress from Vancouver, Wash., north to Olympia, and apparently in another year or two at most, all of the crooks and turns we have learned to know by their first name, will be literally thrown into the discard, and from then on you will wheel along at fifty per and no more corners in the picture.
