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Local, National Order Numbers of Draftees Listed

Order Is Changed by New Names

Numbers Give Basis
For Figuring Military
Service Call Chances

Started in last week's Argus, a list of Washington county's potential military conscripts in the order that their serial numbers were drawn in the national lottery on October 29 is continued in this issue.

With registrants under Beaver-ton and Forest Grove boards listed separately so as to keep order numbers straight, the block of names published last week included 400 county men in the order that they will be called up for a year's military training.

The local order numbers given for names in the following list, as well as for names in the initial list of last week and in consecutive lists to be published in later issues of the Argus, are unofficial, however. An official and precise accurate list of local order numbers and names is an impossibility at this time. An explanation of the follows:
