License Numbers Drawing Slated

Approximately 300 applications for 1941 license plates have been received at the office of the secretary of state during the past two weeks. It was announced today by Secretary of State Earl Snell, who reminded motorists that drawings for low license numbers would be held at Salem on or about November 22.

Oregon drivers who wish to be included in the drawings must have their applications on file not later than the morning of the day the event is scheduled, Snell said. To date, a total of 324 applications have been placed on file.

At the time the drawing for the 1939 plates was made, there were 19,895 applications included and last year, when the 1940 drawing was held, there were 23,026 applications on hand, an increase of 15 per cent. It is expected the applications included in the event this year will be at least 20 per cent over those for last year.

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Ned Ross Writes About the Life Of Guardsmen at Camp Murray

ALOHA—Corporal Ned Ross writes from Fort Lewis to his folks as follows: "Gone with the wind! That phrase has become the favorite slogan of the boys up here. Hats, papers, tents and even bridges are flying through the air! You have no doubt heard of the fate of the Tacoma Narrows bridge. It is located about seven miles from our camp. Although the weather has been very uncooperative, everyone has survived, and a cheerful atmosphere prevails.

"The food situation has been very well taken care of. We are eating plenty of good substantial foods, and best of all is the large portion of turkey and ice cream fed to us on Sundays.

"Our work has become much more exciting. Most schools have been discontinued in favor of actual field experience. For the past week we have been firing 37mm guns. These guns, of course, are much smaller than our large 135 mm, but nevertheless it is providing wonderful experience for the boys.

"Everything possible is being done to make our life more comfortable. The latest improvement being the construction of boardwalks on all tents of the division. General White recently said that we would be in our new barracks by January 3. "If we were not in a warmer climate at that time," adding that "as to that no one

knows. You may draw your own conclusions."

"I had planned on coming home over Armistice Day, but I am told that I will be corporal of the guard on that day, and for that reason I will be unable to leave camp."

Five Men Start Terms in State Penitentiary

Five men convicted in Washington county were taken to the state penitentiary during the past week to serve sentences varying from one to five years.

The longest sentence, not to exceed five years, was meted out to James Lloyd Thompson, 28, transient, on a morals charge. Glenn Wahl, 23, of Yamhill, was sentenced to three years on a check forgery count.

Otis Clarence Hatfield, 22, transient, who held up and robbed a man who was transporting him by car from Newberg to Portland, was given a term of two years. Sentences of one year each were pronounced on John Wesley Spencer, 33, Cornelius, and Wilford John of a washing machine from a shack, Stawson, 30, Portland, for larceny at the Pandey Creek sawmill.

All five men appeared in Judge R. Frank Peters' circuit court.

Long Resident Cornelius Dies

CORNELIUS—Mrs. Maude Burke Wilcox, 73, resident of Cornelius for 25 years, died here November 8 after an illness of a day.

Mrs. Wilcox was born at Charlesworth, Maine, February 17, 1867. Later in life she moved to Jamestown, N. D. November 9, 1904, she married George Wilcox at Independence, where they lived until June, 1911, when they moved to Cornelius. Mr. Wilcox was a member of the Methodist church, the Eastern Star at Independence, the Civic Improvement club, and the library board.

She is survived by two sisters, Mrs. Bertha Stebbins of Morris, Minn., and Mrs. Ida V. Straut of Zenith, Wash.; two nieces, Mrs. Elizabeth Williams of Tacoma, Wash., and Mrs. Velma Gregory of Everett, Wash.

Services were held at the Methodist church Tuesday. Rev. Schrieber officiating. Mrs. Frank Doisher sang, "In the Garden" and "Jerusalem." Mrs. H. V. Jones accompanied. Pallbearers were Gilbert Mooberry, Ashley Jackson, Don Engelen, Frank Doisher, Ernest Creekbaum and Lloyd Wiedewitzsch.
