MARY'S HOME—As two sisters of St. Mary's Home were returning from a visit to St. Mary's of the Valley Saturday, November 9, while walking on the railroad track, two men, evidently hoboes, emerged from the woods, accosted them, and reported that a comrade about 60 years of age lay dying by his campfire. The women hurried on to the Home and telephoned to the sheriff's office. A deputy came promptly with an ambulance, stopped at the Home and took on Rev. William Delplanche, the high school principal. It was learned that the two men had remained with the sick man for four painful days. His clothes were soaked by the continuous rains, and he refused all offers of food. The men loaded him into the ambulance and Rev. Delplanche accompanied the deputy to Hillsboro. The sufferer died in the county hospital within an hour. No papers or anything to identify him were found. Why these two hoboes did not seek aid sooner, in a community that responds quickly to appeals of mercy, remains a mystery.
