Rites Held for Mrs. W. Wilken

Mrs. Hulda Scheidt Wilken, wife of William M. Wilken of North Platte, died in Portland November 19 after an illness of several months.

Hulda Scheidt was born in Menno, South Dakota, December 18, 1887, and was confirmed in Baxter, Iowa, by her father, the late Rev. Edward J. Scheidt, pastor of the Reformed Church. She was graduated from high school in Baxter, Iowa, later attending Iowa State Teachers' college at Cedar Falls, Iowa, then finishing her education at North Dakota State Teachers' college of Valley City. She taught school for a number of years before her marriage to William M. Wilken at Kulm, North Dakota, on August 7, 1918.

Funeral services were held Friday in the Helvetia Reformed church with interment in the Phillips cemetery. Young's Funeral home was in charge of arrangements.

Mrs. Wilken is survived by the widower and three children, William E. Rosary and Cordelia, all at home, and the following brothers and sisters: Herbert E. Scheidt, Brookings; Walter J. Mrs. Mary Elizabeth Sabin, 90, resident of Hillsboro since 1903, died November 29. Funeral services were held Saturday in the Hillsboro Methodist church with vault interment in the Hillsboro cemetery. Funeral arrangements were in charge of Henry Young.

Surviving are two daughters, Mrs. Ora Laws of Hillsboro and Mrs. E. G. Wilson of Seattle; three sisters, Mrs. Lucy Holcomb of Hillsboro, Mrs. Ella Seaver of Plantsville, Conn., and Mrs. Fredonia Clark of Watertown, N. Y.; two grandsons, Vance Norton of Portland and Glenn Norton of Lostine, and one granddaughter, Eleanor Norton of Portland.

Mary Elizabeth Sabin was born October 26, 1850, in Bombay, N. Y. She was married there to Aurelius Sabin in 1872 and 20 years later the couple came to the west coast, settling at Vancouver, Wash. In 1893, they moved to Oregon City and in 1903 to Hillsboro.

Mrs. Sabin had held national office in the Women's Relief corps, was an active member of the Methodist church and a member of the Rebekah lodge here. During her life, she gave many readings and took part in several home talent plays.

Her home was always open and welcome to everyone. She is remembered as a mother to all her children's friends and as a grandmother to her grandsons' friends.

Former City Resident Dies

Elmo Wilburn Reeves, 60, former resident of Hillsboro, died Friday night at McMinnville following an extended illness. Funeral services were held Monday in Young's Funeral home, Hillsboro, with interment in the Fir Lawn cemetery.
