Is the cut in general fund requirements, result of a sizable slash this year in the county budget.

City millage levies alone for the coming year as compared with the current levies are as follows: Hillsboro, 17.6 in 1941 as compared with 17.4 in 1940; Forest Grove, 14.7, 14.7; Beaverton, 17.4, 18.8; Banks, 41.9, 40.4; Cornelius, 17.4, 18.8; Gaston, 22.0, 26.2; Sherwood, 19.6, 20.1, and Tualatin, 14.0, 24.8.

Total valuations of cities gained uniformly with the one exception of Banks, where the assessed value dropped from \$85,750.29 to \$82,486.47 to \$1,886,106.42. Forest Grove from \$949,651.56 to \$977,151.44; Beaverton from \$532,168.70 to \$533,674.70; Cornelius from \$237,779.41 to \$240,314.99; Gaston from \$77,888.36 to \$80,153.95; Sherwood from \$156,128.97 to \$162,061.05 and Tualatin from \$69,159.92 to \$71,367.37.

Losses Suffered

Losses in total assessed valuations were suffered by Forest Grove, Banks and Gaston union high school districts. At Forest Grove, the total value dropped from \$4,694,636.22 in 1940 to \$4,477,127.85 in 1941; in the Banks district, from \$1,120,940.22 to \$1,119,093.97 and in the Gaston district, from \$662,807.03 to \$792,746.40. The Hillsboro union high school district gained from \$5,447,968.54 to \$5,459,429.41 and others increased values in like ratio.

Perpetual Motion Scheme Seen in Rooting of Pigs

Cop Sentenced To Term in Jail

William Henry Cop, 32, Consolidated watchman, who was found guilty by a circuit court jury last week on a reduced charge of assault and battery, was sentenced Thursday by Judge Arlie G. Walker, to one year in the county jail with release on probation at the end of six months.

The probation period, according to Judge Walker's decree, is to last for three years, and Cop is to have credit on his six months for the time that he has already served. Cop was originally charged with assault while armed with a dangerous weapon for an alleged club attack on a fellow watchman.

county to retain more than 50 per cent of monies raised locally by increasing the donation figure per capita. Mrs. Morgan stated. For instance, if donations reach a total which figures 8 cents per capita, the county will retain 75 per cent of the total.

With regard to the present campaign, emphasis is placed on the fact that no personal solicitation is being conducted with the exception of large business houses and offices. These places are being contacted by local committee workers but no seals are being sent this year for sales through the school children according to seals.

Net Red Cross

Many people confuse the sale of tuberculosis Christmas seals and the Red Cross drive. The double-barred cross of the anti-tuberculosis Christmas seal and the American Red Cross are not the same, and have no relation to one another.

In 1929, by mutual agreement, the alliance made several years earlier between the American Red Cross and the National Tuberculosis Association was dissolved. Since then, the double-barred cross has appeared on all the National Tuberculosis association seals, which are now known as "Tuberculosis Christmas seals," and not as Red Cross seals.

Started in 1907

It was in 1907 that Christmas seals were first sold in the United States in Wilmington, Del., by Emily P. Bissell, who wished to raise funds for a little open-air hospital where poor victims of tuberculosis were brought back to health. With \$40 Miss Bissell had 50,000 stamps printed. That was the basis of the campaign as we now know it, a campaign that has done so much to rouse a nation against the disease.

The tuberculosis mortality rate has been lowered in recent years from 95 per 100,000 cases to 29 per 100,000 cases.

Poultry Ranch Visit Interests

ALOHA-HUBER—Going through the egg-laying pavilion of the F. N. Mitchell poultry ranch is like going through a poultry exposition building. The hens show no nervousness in the presence of visitors—really seem glad to have them call. They exchange remarks one with another about the callers that can't be translated into English, and thereby have advantage.

The productivity of the Hansen strain of Mitchell's White Leghorns is raised to the 10th power. The laying record of the 972 year-old hens is from 75 per cent to 80 per cent. Eighty-nine champions have a record of 300 to 351 eggs per individual.

The remarkable Mitchell laying cages have become widely known. They are made of special wire with a heavy galvanized coating and are used for the floors, doors and partitions. All joints are electrically welded. Three men are constantly employed manufacturing batteries of these laying cages for the trade. Two customers near Tigard are now using 7,000 of these cages.

Feeding is done by placing the feed in a hopper that automatically distributes it as the operator walks around the cages, pushing the hopper along the feed trough. Each hen has her food supply directly in front of her cage where she can eat without being molested by greedier hens.

A heavy gauge V-shape galvanized watering trough is provided for each dock of cages. Supply is controlled by a solid brass needle valve, easily adjusted for a constant flow of fresh water without waste.

Cleaning is accomplished by a scraper that is drawn through the dropping board channel. As the droppings are scraped up, an opening in the back of the scraper deposits a thin layer of sawdust or sand on the dropping boards.

Each hen's individual record card is directly in front of her cage. The record board is at a convenient and proper slant for easy recording.

Floors and cages are designed with proper tilt to provide rapid and safe ejection of eggs to the trays in front of the cages. These trays are an extension of the floor and are easy to reach without scratching the hen's hand.

Since no litter is used, its cost is eliminated as well as the troubles caused by wet and dirty litter.

Because each bird is under con-

stant observation her record performance quickly shows if anything is wrong, which permits very close culling. There is no cannibalism. Birds are protected from litter-borne diseases.

All birds have an equal chance to express their inherited laying ability. Recording is easier because no handling of birds is necessary.

Mr. Mitchell recently purchased 47 300-double-pedigreed foundation males.

Each record is kept in its most usable form, enabling one to observe the hen and her record at the same time. This is of value whether in selecting breeding stock or desire to weed out the unprofitable birds.

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
