Winter Pears of Northwest to Be Free Lunch Food

Close to 200,000 boxes of Pacific northwest pears will find their way to school houses throughout the nation, where they will become part of the school lunch program provided for some three million youngsters of low-income families. The Surplus Marketing administration has recently agreed to purchase 194,400 boxes of pears from Oregon-Washington growers this year, who are facing a serious situation as the result of the elimination of foreign markets.

Through its surplus removal programs, the department of agriculture will distribute many carloads of fruits, vegetables, dairy and livestock products to every state in the union this year, in connection with the school lunch project. More than 43,000 schools in low-income sections of the nation served free lunches last year under a similar plan. Three million youngsters out of nine million considered eligible were reached last year, while this year the department hopes to assist five or six million of them.

The school lunch idea has been made possible through the cooperation of rural women who, in local communities, parent-teachers associations, women's clubs, church and welfare groups, have planned and served the lunches after materials were supplied.

The plan has the same general aim as the food stamp program, that is to provide better outlets for surplus food production while making possible better distribution among low-income groups.

Townies' Date Changed

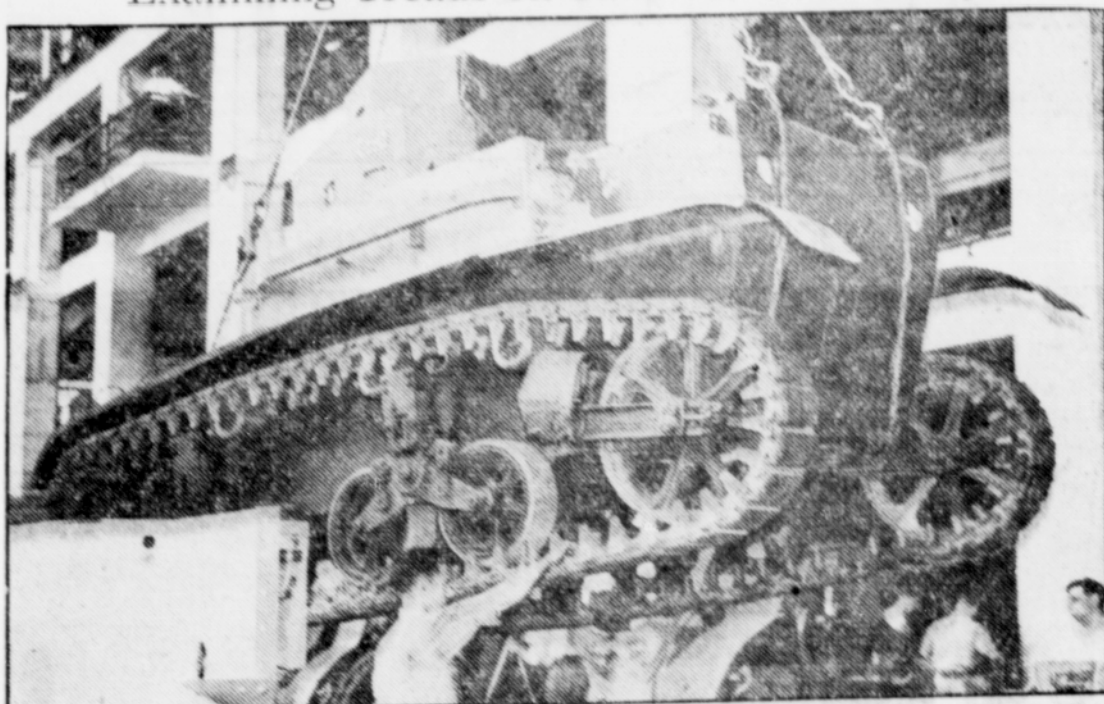

Canary Survives Fire; Complains That "Feet Hurt"

But for speedy resuscitation work of Wilbur Dillon, Hillsboro fire marshal, and his first aid crew, the sweet warble of a pet canary would now be silent in the home of George Hendren of this city. Fire hit the residence Friday and although there was little damage to the house, the canary was a mighty "sick bird" when Marshal Dillon carried it to the firehouse and succeeded in coaxing life back into the feeble body with the aid of an inhalator.

"Smoky," as the bird has been called since his fire experience, is rather uncomfortable with his tiny feet healing from burns, to say nothing of his embarrassment at having his tail-feathers singed off, but he seems to be happy that he came out of it as well as he did.

The fire started from an overheated stove in the living room. Firemen had no trouble in quickly extinguishing the blaze but when they cleared the smoke-filled room, they found the feathered singer lying altogether too still on the bottom of the cage. Ethel Hendren, the houseowner's daughter, feared the bird would have to be killed to end its pitiful suffering, but Marshal Dillon rushed the near-unconscious pet to the firehouse and rendered treatment as scientific as any ever administered.

The bird responded immediately. Oxygen was released in easy doses
