Helen Adams Keller, the blind writer and lecturer, will give a lecture in Hillsboro sometime in February, according to a decision by members at the Coffee club meeting Friday afternoon. Dr. Keller will be in Oregon for several weeks after February 13, and will give a limited number of lectures while in the northwest. Other organizations will be asked to join with the Coffee club in sponsoring this great lecturer in her appearance here.
