

County Meeting On Farm Outlook, Defense Billed

A state-wide series of meetings reaching all counties in Oregon on the general subject of "The Agricultural Outlook and Its Relationship to National Preparedness," has just been announced by William A. Schoenfeld, dean and director of agriculture at Oregon State college. The new series, as was the case with former outlook conferences held periodically since 1921, will be under the general direction of the extension service of which Schoenfeld is director, and William L. Teutsch is assistant director.

The schedule for Washington county calls for the first meeting to be held Tuesday, January 7, with J. R. Beck assisting the local extension staff and the county farm and home leaders.

"It has always been the policy of the extension service to carry information relating to changing national and world conditions which affect market outlets for Oregon commodities," said Teutsch, in explaining the plans and purposes of the meetings. "Always a desirable procedure, this is particularly important under present conditions of world war and America's preparation for defense."

Sub-committees Named
The series of meetings, which will start in January and continue through March 1, will serve as a follow-up to the 1938 economic outlook conferences in which a general conference organization committee was set up with four sub-committees. These sub-committees dealt with land use, farm crops, livestock and farm home and rural life.

The plan is to bring the members of the general committee and these four sub-committees together in each county rather than to hold large mass meetings. These committee members, together with the representatives of 4-H clubs, AAA committees, soil conservation district supervisors and so forth, will devote themselves to the following three subjects:

1. To study past recommendations in the light of changing world conditions.
2. To recommend such further adjustments in the county's agriculture and in conditions affecting farm home and rural life as seem desirable.
3. To consider the contribution which rural people can make toward national preparedness.

County Red Cross Total \$600 Over Figure for 1939

The 1940 roll call of the Washington county Red Cross has collected a total of \$2,801.09 as of January 2, 1941. It was reported this week by Mrs. Carl Clapham, treasurer of the county Red Cross chapter.

Of this total, \$936.25 was contributed in Hillsboro, approximately \$305 in Forest Grove and \$159.75 in Beaverton. Mrs. Clapham said. Some returns from the roll call may still come in to boost the total slightly, it was believed.

H. A. Kurath, Hillsboro, county chairman of the roll call committee, Tuesday expressed satisfaction with the total, which is more than \$600 over the roll call figure for 1939 and about \$300 over the amount raised in a special war relief drive in the spring of 1940.

Kurath extended thanks to the relief contributors and also to the willing corps of Red Cross solicitors "without whose tireless efforts the campaign could not have succeeded." W. M. Kent is the Hillsboro chairman.

Major Share Retained
Over 50 per cent of the money raised in Washington county will be retained locally for Red Cross relief work. A large part of the money being turned into the national headquarters is being used for war relief. The extent of this relief to stricken peoples of hostilities totaled \$12,339,505 up to October 31.

Of this sum \$6,195,846 represents the expenditures and commitments from the American Red Cross war relief fund, and \$2,866,641 from the appropriation by the U. S. Congress for foreign war relief. Chapter produced supplies shipped for war relief are valued at \$3,277,016. Since the beginning of hostilities up to and September 30, chapters produced garments numbering 1,064,353 and 8,295,115 surgical dressings have been shipped.

French Relief Cut
The American Red Cross has sent no relief supplies to France since the "mercy ship" the S. S. McKeen-Porter sailed in June, prior to port, which sailed in June, prior to the collapse of France, and the despatch of two shipments of milk from Switzerland in August. The food, clothing and medical supplies on the McKeen-Porter already have been distributed under the direction of American Red Cross representatives.

Since September 1, 1940, American Red Cross efforts have been directed toward relief of the victims of the warfare in England, and \$7,261,489 has been expended and committed for this purpose. Relief also has been sent to Finland and a program of aid to Chinese war victims has been inaugurated. American Red Cross representative was sent to Finland to supervise distribution, and three representatives were sent to China to supervise the relief measures there.

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Cold? Not at All—Winter of 1930 Hit 14 Degrees Below

An early visitation this year of King Winter and his ice-making kit of tools has had many Hillsborians talking in recent weeks—chatting about past winters and predicting memory for answers to such questions as the following: What was the coldest day on record in Hillsboro? How often does the temperature dive below zero? What is the hottest day on record? And, of course, many others.

In response to such queries, Hillsboro's co-operative weather observer, A. W. Moore, this week delved into his records and came up with precise information which should serve to settle any dispute as to facts.

Coldest Day on Record
The coldest day on record in Hillsboro (official records here have been kept only since November 7, 1929) was on January 21, 1930, when the mercury dropped to 14 degrees below zero. On the day preceding, it was four below and on the 25th day of the same month it was two degrees below.

Low Marks Listed
Low marks for preceding years are on the records as follows: 1936—15 degrees in February; 1935—13 degrees on November 3, 10 degrees in January; 1934—24 degrees in December; 1933—11 degrees in February; 1932—temperatures of 7, 6, 5 and 7 on December 9 to 12, inclusive; 1931—20 degrees in November; 1930—14 degrees below on January 21, and 1929—22 degrees in November.

As far as official records go, the hottest day ever suffered in Hillsboro was in July of 1935, when the mercury soared to a sizzling 107 degrees. Other high marks of 100 degrees or over are on record as follows: 1939—103 degrees in July; 1938—105 degrees in July; 1933—100 degrees in August; 1932—100 degrees in August, and 1931—105 degrees in July.

Years not listed had no temperatures reaching the 100 mark. The top temperature for 1940 was 96 degrees on June 24.

State Low at Ukiah
Much lower and some higher temperatures for Hillsboro are recalled by old-timers but there is no official record to corroborate any statement about temperatures prior to November 7, 1929. Records in other parts of the state, however, make Hillsboro's lowest recorded temperature look like the warmth of a balmy spring day. The lowest low officially known was 54 degrees below zero at Ukiah in February of 1933.

Clyde Maitland, 28, Hillsboro, was lodged in jail this week on a charge of forgery. State Sergeant Walter Hadfield and Deputy Sheriff Elmer Busch made the arrest.

Heft of Theft Dismisses Chance Of 'Weak Moment'
It could not have been "in a moment of weakness" that a thief—or thieves, unknown—walked away with three penny weighing machines and one candy vending machine from sidewalk entrances of stores in Hillsboro and Forest Grove last week. As pointed out by Sheriff J. W. Connell, "it took a moment of strength." The machines were all very heavy.

The weighing machines were taken from the J. C. Penney and Hillsboro Pharmacy entrances in Hillsboro and the Eastwood confectionery entrance at Forest Grove. The candy machine was reported stolen from the Pharmacy.

Among other larceny cases reported to the sheriff's office this week was theft of 49 chickens from the Ray Kuiken place, Beaverton route 1, on the night of December 2. A list in the sheriff's office describes the missing fowls as 23 White Leghorns, 24 Rhode Island Reds and two Bantams, one hen and one rooster.

Herman Cook, Gaston, O. D. Glover Mercantile company employee, reported last week that someone stole a candid camera valued at \$100 from his home sometime since December 17. He sometimes leaves his home unlocked, he told officers.

Two Men Fined on Driving Charges
Two men, both arrested on the last day of 1940 and both charged with "driving while under the influence of intoxicating liquor," were fined in Justice A. W. Havens' court here Thursday morning.

Majority of Bikes In City Licensed
There were 179 operators' licenses, 173 bicycle licenses and seven dealers' licenses issued under the new municipal bicycle code by January 1, 1941, effective date of the ordinance, it was announced this week by Police Chief W. W. Weaver.

Anyone found operating a bicycle without a license or anyone without an operator's license found riding a bicycle within the city limits will now be subject to penalties as provided for in the ordinance, Chief Weaver warned. It is estimated there are 260 or more bicycles in the city.

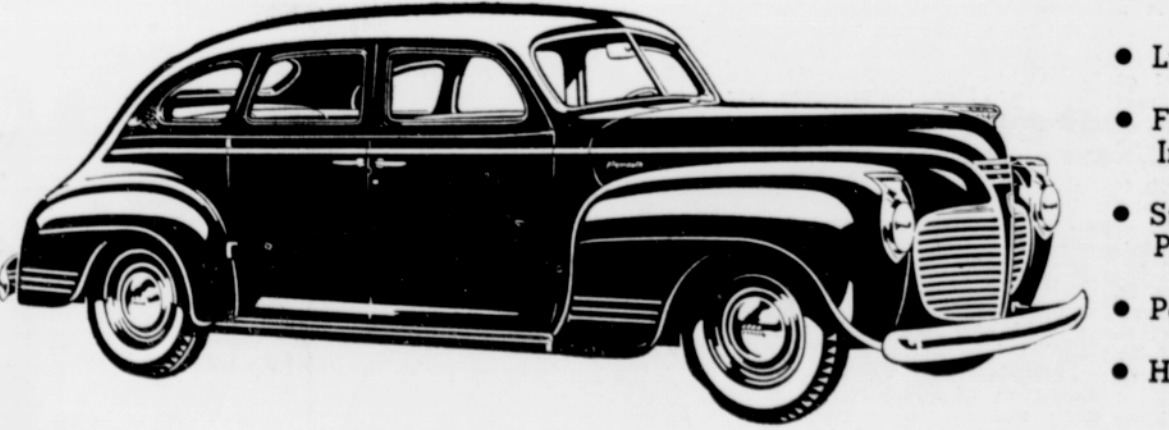
