

1940 Seal Sale Total Breaks All Records

The Christmas seal sale of 1940, first "mail sale" ever conducted in Washington county, broke all previous records, it was announced this week by Mrs. Harry Morgan as a near-final checkup on returns was made.

The latest total of seal purchases was \$2,173.14, well past the \$2000 quota at which the campaign aimed and approximately 50 per cent more than the previous year's total of about \$1400. Two communities have not yet turned in their seal sale receipts.

According to Mrs. Morgan, the increase of contributions this year was due to the mail type of sale conducted. Many organizations and individuals also helped to make this campaign a great success, Mrs. Morgan added.

Because of the high amount raised, the local health association is allowed to retain more than the usual 50 per cent. Approximately 60 per cent will be kept in Washington county for local health work.

In comparison with other counties of Oregon, Washington county compares very favorably, having a larger per capita return than most.

Old Landmark Coming Down

Another old Hillsboro landmark crumbled under the wheels of progress this week as wrecking bars started destruction of the Mrs. W. H. Miller house on Baseline street at Second avenue. The house, originally built by the late J. W. Morgan, former county clerk, and uncle of District Attorney G. Russell Morgan, is remembered by O. B. Gates as the "show place of Hillsboro" when he came here in 1880.

At that time the ornate mansion had been built for little more than a year. The property was kept by the family until 1917, when Mrs. Miller purchased the house and ground. A service station is soon due to go up on the corner, according to Tom Bailey, who recently purchased the historical piece of property.

Hagg Re-elected By Dairymen; Promotion Set

Oscar Hagg, Reedville, president of the Oregon State Dairymen's association, was re-elected to that post Friday as the organization concluded its 48th annual convention at Grants Pass.

One of the principal matters of discussion at the convention was the declining increase of milk production and decreasing birth rate. The dairymen voted support for a proposed law which would tax them 1 cent a pound for all butterfat produced in June this year and in May of following years. The \$35,000 estimated revenue to be used in promotion of increased consumption of dairy products. Enactment of the proposed law will be urged on state legislators by a committee named for that purpose.

P. M. Brandt, head of the animal industries division of Oregon State college, pointed out in a talk on advertising the dairy industry that "We must convince adults that milk can live longer and be more healthy if they drink more milk."

The proposed dairy products advertising commission would be composed of two dairymen from each congressional district, a representative of the dairy manufacturers chosen at large and the director of the state department of agriculture and the head of the dairy department of Oregon State college as ex-officio members without ballot power.

Oscar Hagg was among a number of prominent delegates to the convention who were forced by a party of Grants Pass "cavemen" to drink "dinosaur milk" as part of an initiation ceremony which featured the annual banquet held Thursday night.

Fire Destroys Apartments at Burkhalters

FARMINGTON—A house consisting of three modern apartments occupied by the help employed on the Edwin and George Burkhalters farm was completely destroyed by fire Sunday morning. A woodshed in the rear was burned and a cellar badly damaged.

Mr. and Mrs. Richard Osterloh and Mr. and Mrs. John Leinow occupied two of the apartments. Mr. and Mrs. Osterloh and family were away for the day. By the time the fire was discovered the heat and smoke were so intense it was impossible to save any of the contents of the building. Two new electric refrigerators, all the personal belongings of three other men who occupied the third apartment and over \$100 in currency were destroyed by the blaze.

The buildings were partly covered by insurance. The household effects and all the clothing of the tenants were a total loss. The timely arrival of the Hillsboro fire department and the help of neighbors and passersby saved the other farm buildings.

Lars E. Bladine, Publisher, Dies; Known Here

Lars E. Bladine, 66, publisher of McMinville Telephone-Register and well known throughout the state, died of a heart attack Monday night in a McMinnville hospital. He was a frequent visitor to Hillsboro in connection with his newspaper activities and had made many friends in this vicinity.

He was born in Hudiksvall, Sweden, February 25, 1875, and began a half century of newspaper work in Iowa as a reporter, office boy and operator of a Washington hand press for the Alta (La.) Advertiser. He purchased the Telephone-Register in 1928, the management of that paper going to his son, Jack Bladine, and came to Oregon in 1932.

Publisher in Iowa
Prior to coming to Oregon, Mr. Bladine published several newspapers in Iowa and served as president of both Iowa and Oregon editorial associations. Mr. Bladine had also served as president of the Oregon Press conference. He entered politics in 1921, when President Harding appointed him collector of internal revenue for the Iowa district, and was twice re-appointed by President Coolidge. At one time he was president of the eighth district collectors' association embracing Iowa, Minnesota, Wisconsin, Nebraska and the Dakotas.

He was secretary of the Oregon state republican central committee in the 1936 presidential campaign.

His death came as a shock to countless friends in the newspaper world, many of whom had chatted with him at the recent Oregon press conference in Eugene.
