County Nears Completion of Tax Foreclosure

Foreclosure of tax liens appearing in the 1939 tax foreclosure list of Washington county for which an order of judgment and decree was filed on January 30, 1940, will be completed on January 31, 1941.

If property owners involved do not make redemption of their lands before the deadline date, it was warned in an official statement from the office of County Sheriff J. W. Connell this week.

At the time the tax foreclosure list was published and the decree issued, property owners were informed that their rights of redemption would expire after one year from the date the decree was issued. On the deadline date, those properties that have not previously been redeemed will be automatically decided to Washington county and owners will forfeit all and any rights or interest in these properties to the county, the official statement said.

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Defense Orders Delay Pump Delivery

War department orders for several hundred fire engines in connection with the national defense program are being given precedence over civilian orders with the result that the Forest Grove rural fire district will have to wait for special pump equipment ordered November 15, it was announced Tuesday by Walter Vanderveld, chief of the rural district department.

Construction of the rural fire wagon is being held up, meanwhile, pending arrival of the special equipment and hose, both of which cannot be delivered for some time because of the war department orders. The district recently re-elected all officers for 1941: Oscar Love of Thatcher, president; John Vanduyke of Verboort, vice-president; and Howard Snyder of Dilley, secretary-treasurer.

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Former City Official Dies In California

George Nelson Taggart, well-known resident of Hillsboro for many years, died at Chula Vista, Cal., January 9, after an extended illness, and funeral services were held at Glen Abbey Memorial park in that city Monday.

Mr. Taggart was born in Martinsville, Ind., September 6, 1889. When a youngster of 10 the family moved to Blue Ridge, Harrison county, Missouri. While attending school there he met his future wife, Miss Estella Rigg, and they were married June 11, 1913. Shortly after their marriage he went to Oklahoma to get ready to run for a claim when the strip was thrown open to homesteaders. His bride came down in August of 1913 and assisted him in training his horse for the run.

At noon on September 16, 1933, the starting gun was fired and the race was on. He started from six miles east of Hennessey and ran about 30 miles and staked a claim six miles east of Enid, Oklahoma. Soon after he was appointed justice of the peace of Sherman township, Garfield county, the appointment being signed by President Garfield.

In April, 1903, the family moved to Hillsboro and for several years was associated with L. M. Holland as a building contractor. Their first large jobs were the addition to the grade school on Fourth avenue and the Carnation Milk condenser.

For many years he was agent for the Oregon Journal in this section and in 1920 he and his son, Lawrence, started a truck line to haul the Sunday edition to Tillamook and way points. Mr. Taggart served several years as city councilman during the administration of the late Harry Bagley. He served the first school bus for Hillsboro schools.

Deceased is survived by the widow, a son, Lawrence G. of Bakersfield, Cal.; a daughter, Belle Taggart Picklesimer of Danville, Kentucky; and an adopted daughter, Floy Taggart Thompson; grand-children, Dwight Taggart, Carol and Geraldine Thompson; and Mrs. C. Allen and Betty Picklesimer; a brother Frank K. Taggart, county clerk in Garfield county, Enid, Oklahoma, and a sister, Anna Taggart Joseph of Maukheim, Okla.

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
