

Chamber of Commerce Opposes Proposed CPTC Program Change

Proposed elimination of the civilian pilots' training course as it is now operating and replacement with a similar program under army supervision would work a hardship on instructors now engaged in the CPTC program and should be vigorously opposed when it appears as a bill before congress, it was declared here Monday noon by Mrs. Evelyn Burleson, flight instructor at Albany, in an aviation program talk before the Hillsboro chamber of commerce.

A motion was passed by the chamber to send Oregon's representatives in congress a resolution of opposition to the proposed change in the civilian pilot training program. The chamber's aviation committee and regular officers will operate with Ed Ball, local airport manager, in taking the matter up with other local service clubs.

Would Move South

The plan under consideration would move the CPTC program from the 30th meridian, where a number of "little Randolph fields" would be established by the army. It is claimed by proponents of the change that states above the 30th meridian do not have year-round flying weather. Mrs. Burleson took exception to this claim as it affects Oregon. This state, she said, is blessed with ideal weather for flying.

Under the proposed plan, operators now signed up for the CPTC would be hired to instruct at the "little Randolph fields," but this is objectionable, she felt, because the instructors would have to leave their present homes and lose flight training businesses that are being built up for years.

Discrimination Seen

The plan is discriminatory, she charged, in that it gives this program to the southern states whereas under the present system, its benefits are equally distributed among all the states. Moreover, it was argued, the present system affords an opportunity for youths to remain at home and pursue their regular peace-time lives; in contrast, the proposed system would demand that they leave home and disrupt their living schedules.

Mrs. Burleson further branded the proposal as unfair because CPTC instructors were originally given to flying instructors and ground school instructors is now being formed under the group name of National Aviation training association to fight the legislation through community chambers of commerce, service clubs and organized flying groups. Mrs. Burleson said.

The Albany aviatrix complimented Hillsboro on its airport, which is known throughout the state as "one of the busiest little airports on the Pacific coast," and also paid tribute to Ed Ball, local airport manager, in behalf of his efforts in furthering aviation.

Ball, who attended the aviation meeting, declared that many youths are now being given pilots' training who would not be able to go away from home and schools for the same training elsewhere. Other comments were heard from W. G. Ide, who stressed the necessity of spreading our national defense program into as many localities as possible—a policy which can best be served by the present CPTC program, and J. T. Kovaly, who pointed out that "all-year flying weather" should not be a consideration in training pilots for possible service in the nation's defense.

W. V. McKinney, chairman of the day, said efforts should be made to have Hillsboro's airport designated as a "standby field" inasmuch as it is sometimes clear here when Portland fields are fog-bound.

No Settlement Seen for C. I. O. Woods Strike

A strike of 500 C. I. O. loggers at nine woods camps of the Consolidated Timber company went into its second week Tuesday and no early settlement was expected in spite of peace overtures already under way.

Officials of the Forest Grove local of the U. A. declared Wednesday that the union probably would be agreeable to a suggestion of a federal labor conciliator that the two tree fallers whose dismissal caused the strike be put back on their jobs pending some settlement of the union's demands for back wages for the pair.

The loggers' strike was called on January 13 as a protest against discharge of A. P. Dykstra and Emil Jaakkola, tree fallers at the Harry J. Smith camp near Tillamook. The union charges the men were fired because of union activities and employers contend the men were not efficient.

Auto Accidents Bring Suits Asking \$23,000

Two circuit court actions asking a total of almost \$23,000 damages, both arising from automobile accidents in the county, were filed in the county clerk's office last week.

Donald F. Kern seeks \$20,000 general damages and \$722 special damages for injuries allegedly sustained in a collision of his car with a truck driven by John Ambrose Benefield the evening of September 10, 1940. Plaintiff charges that Benefield was driving the truck over the center line when the two vehicles collided on a curve near Hillsboro's east city limits.

Eldon R. Thompson names Chester A. Inskip Jr. and Viola Maude Inskip as defendants in a suit asking \$2000 general damages and a total of \$255.50 in special damages for injuries allegedly sustained when the car of defendant collided with his machine on the McDaniel road between Cedar Mill and Bonny Slope on August 17, 1940, at about 6:45 p. m.

Six of the eight selective service youths representing the Forest Grove board's first contribution to military training were guests of honor at the chamber of commerce meeting there Monday noon. They are Gordon O. DeMaris, Gaston; John F. Hombarger, Buxton; Robert VanVoorhees, Hillsboro; William Woell, Gales Creek; Marvin Parson, Forest Grove; and Jim Clinebell, Hillsboro, who was called to replace Faurest Anderson of Hillsboro who is ill at home.

Seven Volunteers

The two other youths who were

unable to attend the send-off dinner are Glen F. Road of Hillsboro and Vincent Oscar Leach of Buxton. All but Leach and Clinebell are volunteers.

Major Sol Richanbach, state advisor on occupational deferments, was the main speaker at the chamber banquet with Frank Miller, head man on the Forest Grove draft board, as program chairman.

Major Richanbach declared the "secret of success" for the selective service act as it is now being applied lies in the fact that the conscripted men are selected by their neighbors, local men who know their circumstances and are thus able to judge them for classification.

Nation Is Test

The visiting selective service official explained in detail the various classifications in which deferred youths are being placed. As for occupational deferments, he said, the final determinant is the welfare of the nation—not the individual. In the eyes of the law and in the interests of strict impartiality, hardships worked upon individuals by their being called for service cannot be considered as a factor in their classification.

With regard to marriages which have taken place since the selective service act was enacted or even since local order of potential draftees has been established, the individual problems of classification involved are being left entirely up to the discretion and judgment of the local boards, he said. Moreover, he added, any other problem of

classification or deferment is to be considered according to the individual case—not according to any set rule.

Officials Introduced—Introduced at the chamber meeting were R. W. Weil, chairman of the Beaverton board; Mrs. Lillian Gillam, secretary for the Beaverton board; Mrs. O. V. White and Mrs. Dean Brayman, secretaries for the Forest Grove board; Loyal Graham, Forest Grove advisory board chairman, and Joe McCready, draft appeal agent for the western end of the county.

Looking into the future, Major Richanbach announced that steps are now being taken through cooperation of the Oregon Employment service and the U. S. Employment service to assure re-employment will be waiting for all selective service youths when they return from their year's training.

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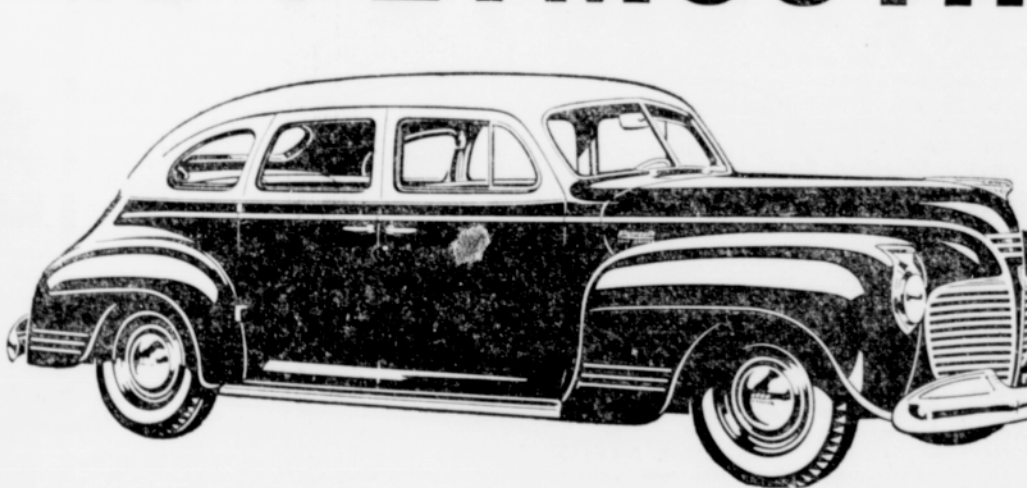
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
