Mitchell, remaining with the Argus until 1907 when he sold his interest to H. G. Guild. From 1907 until 1909 he engaged in the real estate business here. In 1909, Mrs. E. C. McKinney, who purchased Claude Robinson's half interest in the paper, also bought the Guild interest and Mr. Long returned as editor, remaining in this position until 1923. In recent years he has served as bailiff in the circuit court here.
