

A. H. Abts Speaks On Finance at B.P. Club Meet Friday

"Trying to save money from your income without budgeting your expenses is like trying to build a house without first making your plans," said A. H. Abts, of the Commercial National bank, in a talk on "Finance" at the dinner meeting of the Business and Professional Women's club Friday night at the chamber of commerce.

Mr. Abts suggested that an average budget might be listed as follows: Food, 23 per cent; rent, 25 per cent; clothing, 12 per cent; operating expense, 15 per cent; advance (including education, etc.) 15 per cent; savings, 10 per cent. This would, probably have to be varied according to size of family, but would form a nucleus upon which to make a start, the speaker said.

Miss Blanche McCormick, chairman of the finance committee, presented the program.
