

Legislators Get Down to Serious Work; Fireworks Expected Soon

STATEHOUSE, Salem, Jan. 22.—With the usual preliminaries out of the way, the legislature is now down to serious work. The new Oregon code, which was supposed to have been ready for delivery to legislators January 13, started out to be a mess. Several errors were found, but what isn't generally known is that one of the supreme court judges and his secretary found a whole flock of errors. Fortunately, they were corrected and the supreme court put its k on the corrected code. The San Francisco publishing house that did the printing, sweating blood, stood to lose a pretty penny on the deal if the books were rejected, and for a few days it looked as if that very thing would happen. So now the usual flock of new bills can be expected, as legislators have the new code for guidance.

The first seven days of the session were very tame, so to speak. Only two or three highly controversial bills were dropped in the hopper of either house. However, there is plenty of dynamite under the covers, with the fuse in certain legislative pockets, scheduled to have the match touched to it in a few days. The said package of dynamite is wrapped up in a new truck bill, containing additional weight and length to trucks. The railroad lobby is here en masse to see that the bill does not pass and just as many truck men, if not more, are on the job buttonholing every senator and representative possible to see that it does pass. The fur is bound to fly and how.

Not nearly the big lobby here this session that usually appears on the scene, representing everything from soap to nuts, and much to the disappointment of some of the customary entertainment with free drinks and sales seems to be taking place. Many old timers who have been members of the "third house" for years are conspicuous by their absence.

Plenty of political talk is heard around the corridors, although the next election is almost two years away. What will Earl Snell do? Will he be a candidate for governor, or back the top of United States senator? Snell has to retire from the office of secretary of state when his present term expires in January, 1942. No third term for this office. Some of the politically wise think he will be a candidate against Governor Sprague, who is almost certain to seek re-election. Others think Senator McNary will retire at the end of his term in 1943, and if so they believe Snell is a cinch to succeed him.

Observations: The press section of the house is crowded this session; just room enough to turn around and that's all. C. C. Chapman, editor of Oregon Voter, seems to be more at ease as a member of the fourth estate than as a lawmaker, which he was last session. Many new faces among members of both houses. The house seems strange without a woman legislator, Hannah Martin and Mrs. Manroe are not present this year. Senator Dorothy McCullough Lee is the only woman of the upper house.
