BUXTON—Richard W. Manley, Buxton merchant, died at a Forest Grove hospital January 16 after an illness of one week. Funeral services were held Sunday at the Forest Grove Undertaking company chapel and vault entombment was at River-view mausoleum. Rev. C. P. Sabin officiated.

Mr. Manley was born in Dublin, Ireland, July 23, 1883, and came to the United States at the age of five years. The Manley family came to Buxton in August, 1930, from Kennewick, Wash. He and Mrs. Manley had been in business at Kennewick and Pasco, Wash., for several years before coming to Buxton. They have owned and operated the local Red and White Store since coming here.

Mr. Manley is survived by the widow, Mrs. Mildred Manley; one daughter, Mrs. Bonnie Kommer; one granddaughter, Audrey Louise Kommer, all of Buxton. County receives Highway Tax Share
A state warrant for \$14,935.27, representing the final apportionment of state highway funds due Washington county for the year 1940, was received Saturday by County Treasurer Maud W. Boscow.

Washington county's total share in the state highway funds for 1940 was \$87,365.23, the major part of this amount having been received in previous apportionments. The entire apportionment to all counties as of January 18 was \$410,961.39, balance left after \$2,000,000 of the counties' \$2,410,961.39 share in the state fund was paid out by the end of the year.

The apportioned money represented 15.7 per cent of the 1940 revenues from motor vehicle and operators' registration fees, motor vehicle fuel taxes, motor carrier fees and fines for traffic violations. The apportionment was based upon the 1939 registration of motor vehicles in each county.
