

### Many Pension Bills Given Lawmakers

it, with the state highway commission and truck men galore for the measure. Consensus of opinion around these parts gives the bill a 50-50 chance to pass, but it will be a fight by both sides every inch of the way.

The civil liberties bill, sponsored by numerous colored folks, will be introduced again this session. The same bill was defeated by the last legislature, when the Hotel and Restaurant Men's association fought the measure to a standstill. The bill would compel hotels and cafes to serve colored people.

Another measure which is sure to come up again is a brand new milk bill, clipping the wings of the milk control board. Last session a senate bill aimed at the milk board lost by the very close margin of only two votes. Senator Mahoney will again carry the banner for the new measure to curtail milk board activities.

And another group of bills which are sure to cause quite a stir are the several wine bills that would grant the right to serve wine by the glass, drastically curtail the sale of fortified wines, and almost bar the sale of any wine except Oregon made products.

A nice keen-edged anti-chain banking bill is in the making and probably will see the light of day next week. The measure will have considerable support and may cause the chain bankers real grief. Here is another bill that passed the house last session only to meet death in the senate. About 23 representatives had their names on the measure, and the same tactics will be tried this session with a flock of senatorial names added for good effect.
