

Cornelius Club Host To County Federation

CORNELIUS—The County Federation of Women's clubs was entertained Saturday by the Cornelius Civic club in the school gymnasium in an all-day session.

Mrs. Edward Conklin of Metzger, federation president, presided at the meeting. Morning session began with the business reports from various committees. History of the scholarship loan fund was given by Mrs. Fred Hundley, chairman. Reports of work done by clubs during the year were given by club presidents.

The girls' trio of Beaverton high school sang two numbers.

Mrs. Conklin spoke on the uses of the endowment and foundation fund.

Lunch was served in the dining room by the Cornelius club.

The afternoon session began with music by the Cornelius grade school chorus directed by Mrs. Helen Austin, and accompanied by Mrs. L. Cochran.

Mrs. Gerald Brees of Pacific University spoke on "What These Young People Think."

Miss Kathleen McCrae, County Home demonstration agent, gave a talk on "Beginnings of Democracy."

Lynn Meredith of Gaston, who was awarded the county music scholarship at Pacific University, played three piano selections.

Mrs. Mary Roberts of Forest Grove, district publicity chairman, spoke on club publicity and stressed the importance of each club keeping press books.

Mrs. Helen Austin, president of the county health association, reported on the sale and uses of funds of the Christmas seals.

Mrs. William Chandlee of Scholls Women's club, who is endorsed by the county federation, as a candidate for financial secretary of the state federation at the convention, which will be held at Corvallis in June.

In Mrs. Hundley's report on the scholarship loan fund, she stated that 1771 loans have been made to Oregon girls, and in the 32 years since the establishment of this fund the loss has been less than 3 1/2 per cent.

Fifty-five Oregon girls and two Washington county girls have received this loan within the year. Oregon has the largest fund of this kind in the nation, she said.

Mrs. W. R. Manley of Hillsboro reported on Americanization. She said it should be made possible through the clubs for every school in the county to have a flag. She announced that Americanization classes have been started in Hillsboro and Forest Grove.

People in getting citizenship papers, and that literature is being furnished free for Americanization work.

She invited the assembly to hear Mrs. John T. Richardson, national Americanization chairman of the D. A. R., who will speak in Hillsboro on February 10.

Mrs. F. Abendroth, county parliamentary chairman, reported that much interest is being displayed in parliamentary law.
