He had been living with his daughter, Mrs. W. H. Hall, in the Yamhill county seat. Others surviving are a second daughter, Mrs. Greaser Hutchinson, Wenatchee, Wash., two sons, Thomas and Brown, Wash., and Maurice of Portland, several grandchildren and three great-grandchildren in McMinnville.

Danger Points Of Driving Cited by Snell

Two dangerous driving practices, recently called to the attention of the state traffic safety division by Oregon residents, need correcting in the interest of greater highway safety, according to Earl Snell, secretary of state.

One is the practice of following the center stripe on highways so closely as to invite a collision with an approaching car and the other is failure to dim lights when driving directly behind a vehicle at night.

Several accidents have been caused by cars driving too close to the center stripe, particularly in fog, it was said. Under such conditions, drivers were warned to keep well to their own side of the center stripe in order to avoid side-swiping an approaching car which also might be too close to the center line.

Failure to dim lights when following another car may be as serious as failing to dim when meeting a car, Oregon residents informed the safety division. Bright lights reflecting back into the eyes of the driver from his windshield or rear-view mirror may temporarily blind the driver and cause an accident.

In the interest of safer driving, Snell urged drivers to remember these two dangerous practices and avoid them in their driving.

HIGHWAY SHOULDERS NO PLACE TO SWERVE

Gas Tax Revenues
Jump Eight Per Cent
A total of \$11,011,122.34 has been collected by the State of Oregon during the first ten months of 1940 in gasoline taxes according to the Oregon State Motor association. In accordance with the intent of the 1919 Oregon legislature which enacted the first gasoline tax bill in the country, all of the funds are turned over to the highway commission for use on the Oregon highway system.

The collections for the first ten months of 1940 have jumped \$839,720.20 above the same period in 1939—a gain of 8.2 per cent. Total gasoline taxes collected since 1919 amount to more than 128 million dollars.

The motor association's announcement revealed that the motorist paid 29.8 per cent of all taxes collected by the 48 states for the fiscal year ending June 30, 1940. Of this total \$41 million was from gasoline taxes and \$39 million from motor vehicle registrations. The gasoline tax was the biggest single source of revenue for all states.

Red Cross Aid Fights Gangrene In Greek Ranks

Imperative need for anti-tetanus and anti-gas gangrene sera for Greek wounded was communicated last week by cable to the American Red Cross. The sera was immediately sent on the Pan-American clipper plane from New York for Lisbon, and the remainder of a large consignment costing \$25,000 was later loaded on the American export liner "Excalibur." The Red Cross announced. The clipper shipment contained 18 pounds anti-gas gangrene and 25 pounds anti-tetanus. The "Excalibur" carried an additional 450 pounds. The sera will be consigned to the American minister in Lisbon for delivery to the Greek consul who has been requested to transport by airplane, if possible.

Charles House, American Red Cross representative in Athens, reported on the imperative need for the sera. Mr. House's cable stated great difficulty was being encountered in the transport of wounded soldiers over the mountains.

Increase Noted In Revocation Of Licenses

Revocations of drivers' licenses following conviction for driving while intoxicated totaled 61 during the month of December in 1940, an increase of eight per cent over revocations for the same offense during December of 1939. Earl Snell, secretary of state, disclosed today.

Revocation in such cases is mandatory under state law, said Snell, explaining that apparently there is a misunderstanding in the minds of many persons on this point. He stressed the fact that revocation was not discretionary on the part of the convicting judge nor the secretary of state, the law clearly stating that the license must be revoked upon receipt of the record of conviction.

Runs for Three Years
In actual practice, Snell revealed, this revocation usually runs for a period of three years. Ninety-four per cent of the drivers who lose their licenses in this manner, are unable to regain them before the three-year period expires. If, during the first year, the convicting judge so recommends and the driver can furnish proof of financial responsibility, he may apply for reinstatement. Without the judge's recommendation, he is not entitled to apply till after one year. At that time and any time during the ensuing two years, the driver may apply for reinstatement providing

he is able to file proof of financial responsibility.

Since in actual practice, only six per cent of those whose licenses are revoked are able to obtain this proof, the great majority must go without their licenses for the entire three-year period, Snell emphasized. At the end of this period, the individual may regain his license by passing the driver's license examination.

Proof Defined
Proof of financial responsibility may be given by the following alternate methods, according to Oregon law: either by filing proof that a policy of liability insurance for \$5,000 to \$10,000 has been obtained; that a bond for this amount has been executed; or that a deposit to this amount has been made in cash or certain securities with the state treasurer.

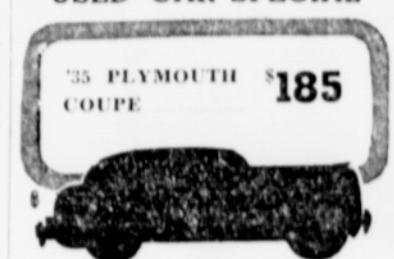
