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## West Discusses Balkans and War Situation

Aid to Britain and her allies is all important to the welfare of the United States in the opinion of Jack West, who talked at the Rotary club luncheon Thursday noon on the Balkan situation and its relation to the present world turmoil.

West's talk was based on his observations and study of the Balkans as a special agent of the United States department of state for two years following World War No. 1.

He declared that unity is necessary to success and expressed the belief that there would have been no war if all the nations now overrun by Nazis had stood together solidly on an agreement to go to war if any one of them were attacked.

West also said that France would still be holding out if the Maginot line had been built through to the coast along the Belgium border.

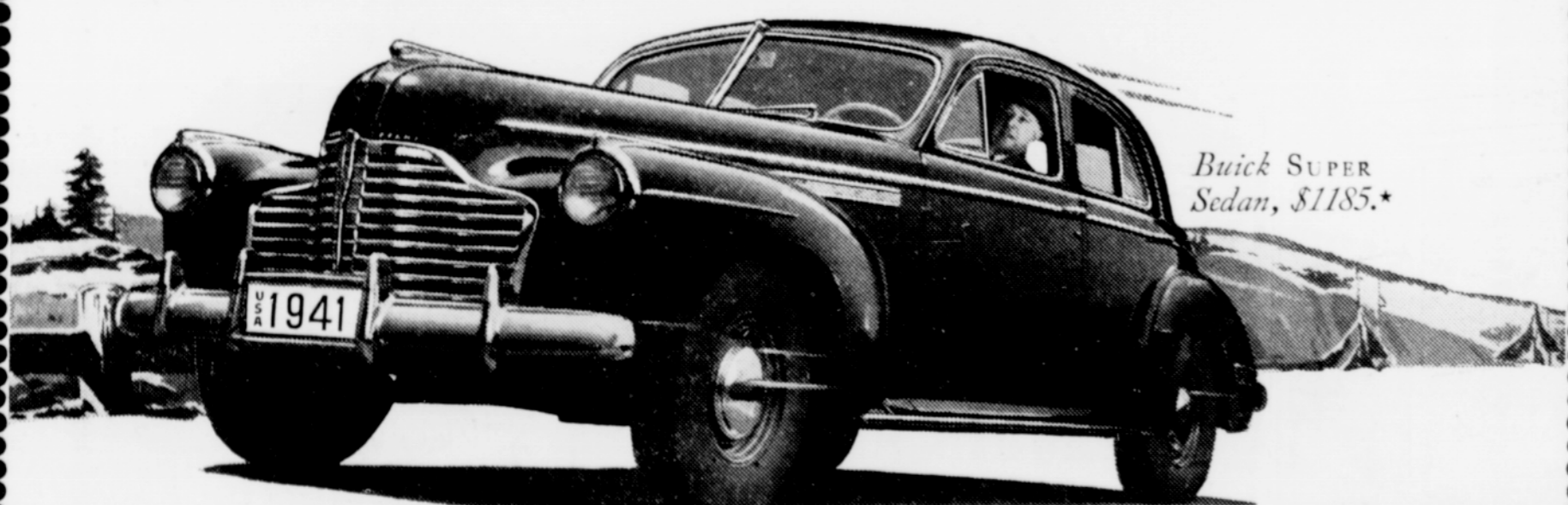
