

Episcopal Church Burns Mortgage

The burning of a mortgage which for 15 years and more represented indebtedness against the Episcopal church here was highlighted ceremony for a church "get-together" held last Wednesday night and attended by a gathering of 125 members of the congregation and visiting clergymen.

A pot-luck dinner preceded the ceremony. Women in charge of the dinner were Mesdames John Kelley, chairman; V. W. Gardner, Ethel Powers, E. N. Crockett, S. W. Melhuish, N. E. Haworth and S. W. Thwaite and Mesdames Corinne Pennington and Virginia Huson. Mrs. Melhuish was master of ceremonies.

Congratulations on retirement of the debt were extended to Rev. Newton D. Penberthy, vicar of the All Saints church here, by three visiting priests of his faith, Fathers Hale Eubanks of Toledo; Father Bernard Geiser, chaplain at the Good Samaritan hospital, Portland, and Father J. L. Lewis of McMinnville. Father Geiser was accompanied by Mrs. Geiser.

The mortgage debt was incurred at the time an addition was built to the Episcopal church. Of the original total of \$1600 and \$1700, about half was still unpaid when Father Penberthy became the pastor here in 1938, the balance having been retired since his advent as head of the church.

Father Penberthy has announced, meanwhile, that the church is looking forward to the time when permanent brick structures for church and parish house will replace the present wooden building on the Washington street property.

Americanization Talk Here Monday Night
