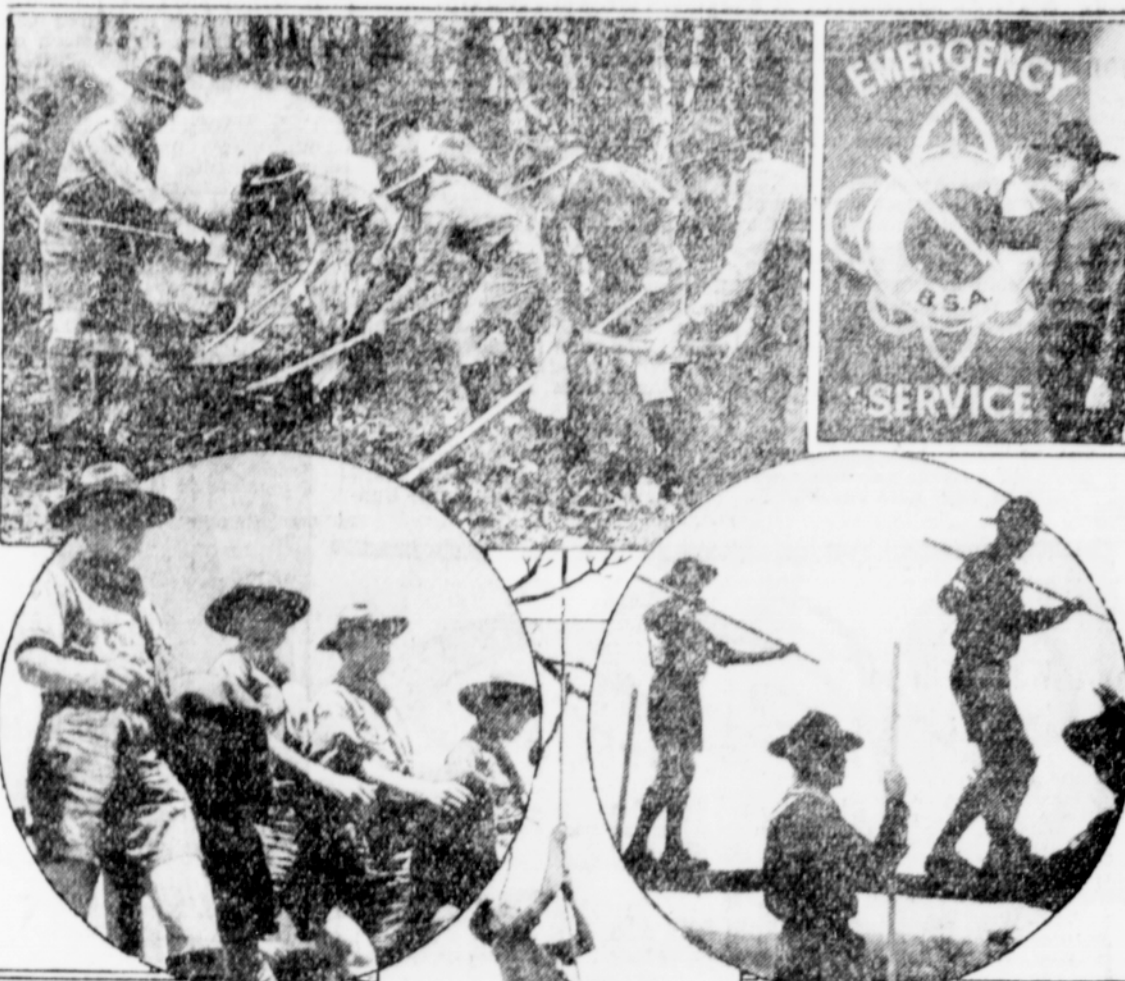
Open House for School Slated

Farmers See Danger In War Period

er himself" is a statement made in one of these committee reports. Conditions may develop that alter the situation materially but as facts and conditions are viewed at this time it appears that those things the farmer can do on his own farm in his own operations are going to be most important of all.
Most of these can be summed up by saying that economy of production is perhaps going to determine during the next few years if the farmer is able to weather the storm. The most important of all factors in economy of production is that of obtaining high unit yields which means growing as much as possible per acre and getting as large production as possible from each animal unit whether it be a hen, a cow, or any other domestic species of livestock.
Those crops and products which are consumed in domestic markets offer greater opportunities for income the next two or three years, said these committeemen, than crops of an export type. In Washington county the principal export type of crop is prunes. The immediate future for this crop does not look very promising but it may be that increased employment in this country, meaning increased purchasing power, may improve the prune situation. With the major part of export markets gone those areas not dependent on crops largely of export type are in a relatively fortunate position.
Culling in the dairy herd to

eliminate the unprofitable producer, developing a breeding program that will improve the production per unit, and using feeding practices that will get the most in production economically were recommendations made by the livestock committee.
The alfalfa acreage in the county should be doubled in the interest of economical hay production but the committee felt that this was not likely to occur as long as there are set prices for pea and vetch seed. These farmers thought that the acreage of Austrian peas, in fact the total of the annual acreage of winter legumes, is as large as it should be.

The 20,000 acres of these seed crops grown in 1940 is as large as good farming practice will permit. It has become rather well established that these crops need to be rotated and not grown on the same land year after year. Consequently, very much increase in acreage would mean that the total land area would be greater than can be worked into an effective rotation plan.

Improvement Needed
If our hill lands are to be turned over to the next generation in anything like as good condition as they are now in we must improve our farming system particularly as related to controlling erosion. Splitting up the strawberry acreage of the county among more farms, thereby decreasing the acreage per farm, it was suggested would make it possible to carry soil conservation practices that would prolong the fertility of these hill lands and prevent much of them washing down into the canyons as is now occurring.

ring. In the opinion of the committee probably 4000 acres of hill land in this county should be seeded to grass which would be used for seed or pasture and in some instances both.

These committee reports did not go into production questions as exhaustively as prior conferences have. They took up rather where other conferences left off, reviewing
