loans and decreased outside investments, declared Mr. Brown. The country bank, he said, should make every effort to satisfy the credit demands of its community. Four-H club work in Oregon is the most outstanding of any state in the union, according to the New Yorker, who said we may have to look to these young people to save our American way of life.

Mr. Otis held that there was nothing more important in the preservation of our democracy than that of assisting our boys and girls on the farms. Oregon bankers, he said, have been leading for 12 years in the nation for their cooperation with the agricultural interests and have been a large influence in starting and keeping the movement going throughout the United States.

Robert Warrens, speaking on behalf of the farmers, declared that it is too bad initiative and thrift are being discounted as they are today. He declared that several Washington county bankers fit the model as outlined by Mr. Brown, of New York. He particularly cited the value to a community of locally owned and operated banks.
