H. Hagg Elected Challenge Group Vice-President

Henry Hagg was elected vice-president of the Challenge creamery association at their recent annual meeting at Los Angeles. The Challenge creamery organization consists of 64 cooperative member creameries owned by 33,000 farm families scattered over nine western states.

Washington county butterfat is sold through the Challenge organization. Both the dairy cooperative in Portland and the farmers' cooperative creamery in McMinnville are members of the Challenge association through the Interstate Creamery association. The Challenge organization is the sales agency for the Interstate creamery group through which Oregon butter is marketed in California and in the middle western states.

Mr. Hagg has served for six years as director of the dairy cooperative in Portland and the farmers' cooperative creamery in McMinnville. He is a member of the board of directors of the Interstate Creamery association. The Interstate association became affiliated with the Challenge group only two years ago and Mr. Hagg has represented them on the Challenge board that entire time.

A large per cent of the milk and butter handled from the dairy co-op comes from Washington county. The farmers' cooperative creamery of McMinnville buys rather heavily of butterfat in the south and southwest parts of Washington county. Consequently, the success and direction of these organizations and their sales agencies are highly important to the Washington county dairy industry.

Charles J. Herb, Forest Grove, was named vice-president, and Arthur M. S. Stook, Hillsboro, was re-elected secretary-treasurer.

Re-elected to the board at the association meeting were Milton N. Simon of Forest Grove and Charles J. Herb of Forest Grove. E. M. McKnight was elected to serve the unexpired term of D. G. Lilly, deceased.

During 1940 14 new federal land bank loans for \$32,400 were closed in Washington county through the Tualatin Valley association. Stook told the membership. The association makes and serves land bank loans in the county. Eighteen loans with face amounts totaling \$49,600 were paid off during the year and creditable progress in the reduction of indebtedness was made by other members, Stook reported.

He reported that the federal land bank had not acquired a single acre in Washington county in 1940. On the other hand, the bank sold three farms in the county acquired in previous years. The bank today is practically out of the land loan class in the county, which accounts for \$1,675,200 of the land bank's total \$100,000,000 of first mortgage loans outstanding in the four Pacific northwest states.

Poultry Meeting Set for Beaverton

Maintaining egg quality and laying cages versus birds on the floor will be discussed by N. L. Bennion, extension poultryman, at the regular poultrymen's meeting to be held Tuesday, February 18, at 8 p. m., in the Beaverton high school, reports Palmer Torvend, assistant county agent.
