**Dog License Rate Faster Than 1940**

The rush for licenses has only started, however. A total of 2000 licenses had been issued before the March 1 deadline date last year and a total of 3350 licenses were issued for the year. 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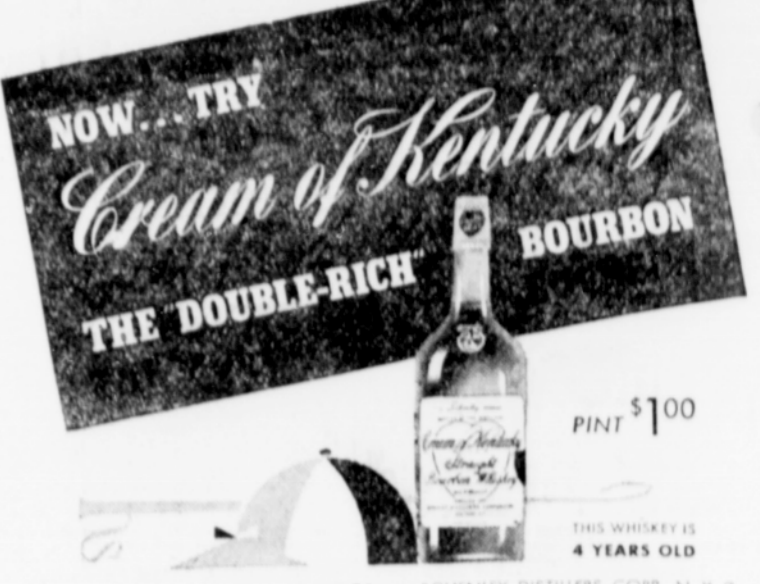
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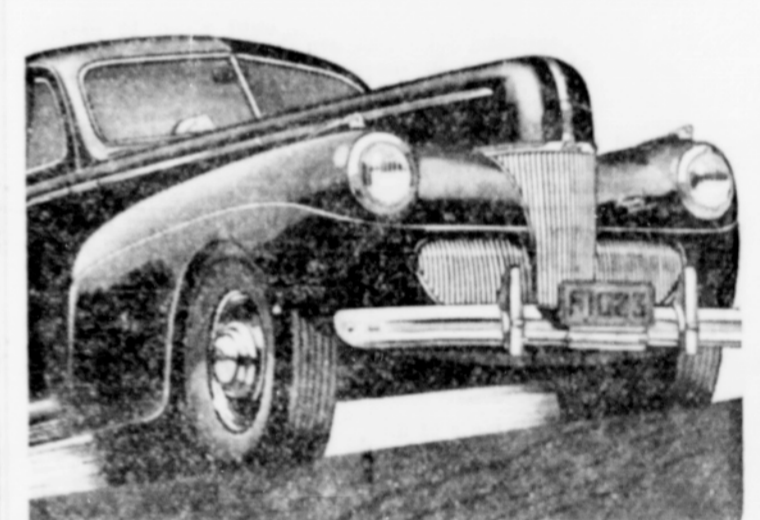
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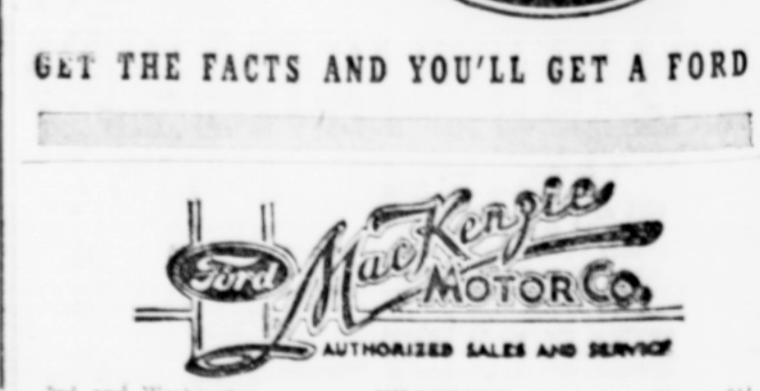
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
