

Hagg Re-elected Head of County Herd Group

Henry Hagg, Reedville, was re-elected president of the Washington County Herd Improvement Association for his third term at a group meeting for its annual business meeting here Tuesday.

Other officers elected at the all-day session were J. H. Public, West Union, vice-president; Mrs. Warren Corey, Mountaineer, secretary; Fred H. Jony, Rock Creek, and C. E. Buchanan Jr., Gaston, directors.

The outlook for the dairy industry is "not too good" at the present time and the dairyman should be getting his feet braced for some tough sledding when current prices begin to fall, it was declared by T. M. Brandt, head of the division of animal industry at Oregon State college, in one of the highlight talks of the day.

Factors given Brandt cited factors that point toward declining prices on dairy products: 1. Increased cost of machinery with consequent reduction in production costs; 2. Shorter hours for workers; and 3. The declining birthrate, which threatens to cut demand as it thins in the past.

Buena M. Maria, extension specialist on family relationships, was the featured speaker on a luncheon program. She stressed the need for happiness as well as success for the family. Declaring that democracy should prevail in the family, she urged that problems should be discussed rather than argued and that opinions from every member of the family should be considered with tolerance.

President Henry Hagg presided at the luncheon meeting and Miss Kathleen McCree, county home demonstration agent, introduced the main speaker.

Family Relations Discussed Before County PTA Meet

Mrs. Buena M. Maria, parent education specialist at O. S. C., talked on "You Can Lead Horses to Water" at the County Council of Parents and Teachers meeting Tuesday night at Aloha Grange hall. Stressing the point of bringing up children for their own happiness as well as a credit to their parents, she said the four things everyone has the desire for are security, adventure, recognition and love, and that the real adventure of life is after marriage.

Mrs. Maria stressed that parents should early in a child's life try to formulate a plan of what they would like to have their child be at 21, but see that the ground work laid during the first five years was of the very best to carry the youngster through the trying period of adolescence. It was also brought out that often during this adolescent period parents are prone to find fault with the youngster's dress, lipstick, gang, etc. and seldom give praise given.
