"Methodist Sam" To Tell His Story Sunday Afternoon

The Rev. S. E. Polovina, better known as "Methodist Sam," is an American by birth, an American by choice, and ordained minister in the Methodist church. He is widely known throughout the middle west and east as an evangelist. He has spoken in over 1,000 churches and over 1,500 high schools and colleges, and has made numerous radio talks. During the World War he served as a chaplain in the United States army camp.

Rev. Polovina came to this country at the age of 29 unable to speak a word of the English language. He worked in a coal mine and learned his A. B. C.'s on a coal shovel. After working in a coal mine for six years he started in the ministry and since then he has preached in practically every country in the world. He has crossed the ocean 15 times.

Mr. Polovina had the privilege of meeting the late Colonel Theodore Roosevelt, to whom he related his life story, and the latter, impressed by the remarkable story, urged him to make a tour of the United States on the lecture platform in the interest of his fellow men.

The late William J. Bryan was another celebrity who heard Rev. Polovina at the Winona Lake Bible conference and he, like Mr. Roosevelt, was greatly impressed with the message. Such commendations coming from men of the type of Mr. Roosevelt and Mr. Bryan should insure that the story is worth hearing.

He will relate this story at his closing service at the Hillsboro Methodist church next Sunday afternoon at 3 o'clock. He will also preach at 11 o'clock, and there will be a chicken dinner for members of the congregation (spot-lick style) following this service. The chickens have been provided for. The services during the past two weeks have been well attended, according to the pastor, Rev. Ira R. Aldrich.
