

Typing Experts Visit at Hilhi; Speed is Shown

Ralph Walker and Miss Louise English from the Behrke-Walker business college in Portland visited the Hillsboro high school Wednesday, February 5. They put on a demonstration for each typing class.

Miss English, who is a typing instructor at the college, typed at all speeds ranging from 30 words a minute to 300. She has typed faster than this. She typed 111 words a minute while carrying on a conversation with one of the students and 112 words a minute while orally spelling 21 words. She has typed in many contests and won her first typewriter four months and ten days of typing.

She demonstrated the correct position and technique of typing and gave some pointers on how to increase typing speed and decrease errors. The students all enjoyed a demonstration of how a poor stenographer types. She did everything that a good stenographer wouldn't do and nothing that a good one would do.

Walker answered student questions about the college and gave some good suggestions on how to improve typing ability.

visiting Mr. and Mrs. Fred Stowell. From Hyderwood they will go to Chehalis to visit Mr. and Mrs. Erin Stowell.

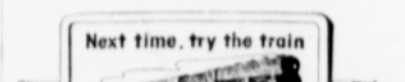
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Services were held Monday in the Forest Grove Undertaking company chapel. Rev. Dunlap officiating, with interment in the Forest View cemetery.
