Advertising Like Courtship, Agency Expert Declares

Advertising which successfully entices a sale is like courtship which ends in the church or before the justice of peace. Such was the analogy drawn by A. E. House of the MacWilkins and Cole advertising agency, Portland, in a "shop talk" before the Hillsboro chamber of commerce Monday noon.

House contended that if local businessmen would take as much interest in and spend as much time on their advertising problems as they did with the "best girl," their results would also be comparable.

The Portland man labeled publicity as the "advertising man's headache" and declared there is only one sure way to get publicity—"that is to make news." By use of a series of charts, he defined what is called the "purchase-sale" cycle and pointed out that advertising should be so worded as to deliver the properly shaded message at the proper time.

House lauded the Audit Bureau of Circulation, to which the Argus subscribes, as an advertiser's insurance—a guarantee to the advertiser that he is really getting the advertising coverage that is claimed by the advertising medium.

The Hillsboro Argus, he said, is rated highly in the advertising world. Ed Coman, advertising manager of the Argus, was chairman of the day.

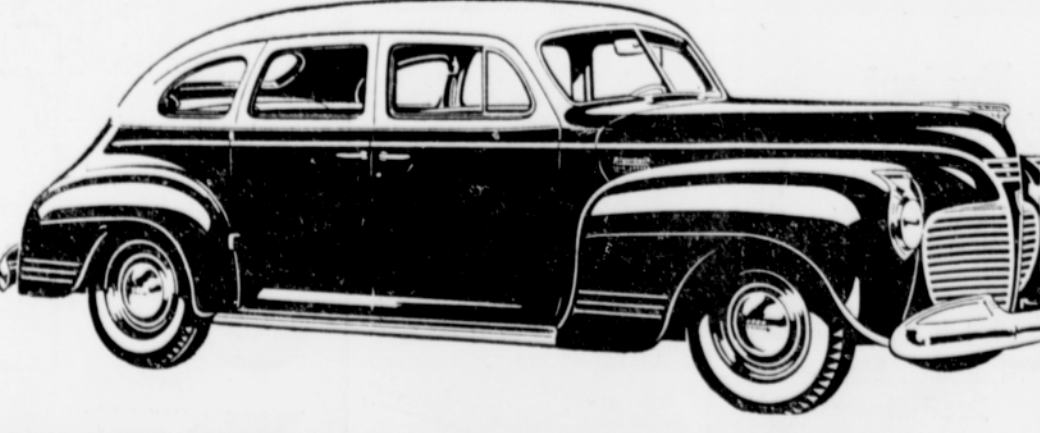
